An unusual oil field exists in west-central Illinois.

Located in Hancock and McDonough Counties, it is unusual in several different ways. It is isolated from other oil fields; the oil is pumped from a very shallow depth; it utilizes out-dated equipment that is different than most in use today; it is small in size; and it is not served by a major pipeline. Nearly all of the oil is refined and consumed within a local market area.

The presence of the oil field has made the Colmar-Plymouth Area an area of cultural diversity. It is distinct in west-central Illinois. The oil wells, the oil-gathering system, and other associated features of the oil field, make the Colmar-Plymouth Area noticeably different than its surrounding areas.

When the Colmar-Plymouth Oil Field was discovered and developed from 1914 to 1916, a large boom occurred in the vicinity. The presence of oil created a great local impact, especially in the small town of Colmar.

Today the oil field still wields an impact, although much smaller and different than its original impact.

The Colmar-Plymouth Oil Field is not expected to continue production much longer. It is anticipated that a new method of secondary recovery will extract the available

reserves and leave practically no crude oil remaining underground no later than twenty years from now. When this happens, the oil field will disappear, and the Colmar-Plymouth Area will lose its uniqueness.
