CHANGES TO THE MAJOR

If you haven't paid attention to the undergraduate Psychology major recently, here are some changes to the program.

New Required Careers Course

Students and their families are rightly concerned with getting jobs after graduation, but are not always sure how to plan for a career. To address this, the Department has long had a Careers in Psychology course and in 2021 this course was expanded and new students are now required to take it. The course, *Psychology as a Science and Profession*, has two goals: to prepare students for their upper-level Psychology courses by giving them more practice in writing, and to help them decide on a career. Students will take this course while still early in their major, so they can use their time at WIU to build skills and find experiences that will help them in their future careers.

Quad Cities

In 2019, students on the Quad Cities campus got the opportunity to choose Psychology as a major, and it quickly became popular. Two full-time faculty relocated from the Macomb campus to join a part-time instructor and now provide a variety of courses to students at the Riverfront campus on the bank of the Mississippi. Almost twenty percent of Psychology majors are now at the Quad Cities campus.

New Minor

Students can now choose to minor in Mental Health, where they take a variety of courses including Clinical Psychology and Psychopathology (formerly Abnormal Psychology). It has proven to be popular, with 84 students across campus in the minor.

HOTLINE CELEBRATES 50 YEARS

In 1971, students in the Psychology Department created a phone crisis call center called Hotline. This was in response to concerns about the suicide rate in the county. Since then, WIU students have run Hotline under the guidance of a faculty member with clinical training. Student volunteers are trained to provide telephone and text support, crisis intervention, and referrals. Hotline is open every night that the residence halls are open. In Fall 2021 Hotline celebrated its 50th anniversary. Thank you to the hundreds of student volunteers who helped make Hotline successful over the years!



STUDENT ACHIEVEMENTS


After a two year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic, in May the department met in person to celebrate the success of students with its annual Student Awards Ceremony.


