COURSE DESCRIPTION AND PREREQUISITES:

AGEC 349 Agribusiness Management explores management functions and economics of agricultural organizations and operations, including input-output analysis, efficient allocation of resources, enterprise combinations, and budget analysis. A significant portion of the course will be devoted to human relationships in management. The prerequisite for this course is Agriculture 220 or equivalent.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

At the conclusion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Explain the role of Agribusiness in the U.S. economy.
- 2. Define the four functions of management and explain how they are interconnected.
- 3. Apply the case study method for problem solving.
- 4. Identify and assess managerial strengths and weaknesses.
- 5. Be familiar with key management trends.
- 6. Understand the human factor and how it impacts management.
- 7. Evaluate personal opportunities for association with an agribusiness firm.
- 8. Be able to develop a basic business plan.

Assignments will not be accepted after the problem set has been discussed in class.

EXAMS:

There will be 2 midterms and one final exam. Exams will consist mostly of multiple choice questions along with a limited number of short answer questions and/or problem solving questions. The final exam will be comprehensive. Makeup exams will only be given in extreme situations.

GROUP PROJECTS:

Students will complete two team-based projects. The first project will be to develop a business plan concept and the second one to solve a case study. More details on will be provided in class.
