COURSE DESCRIPTION AND PREREQUISITES

INAG 361- International Agriculture Travel Study in the Western Hemisphere. (Global Issues) The study of the history and culture of a region, integrated with agricultural production, processing, development, and trade through classroom instruction and international travel. A maximum of six credits of INAG 361 and INAG 362 can be used toward departmental electives.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. Students will be able to compare and contrast Costa Rican and US agriculture and related policies.
- 2. Students will define culture in their own words and use that definition to compare and contrast the culture they experience at home to the culture they experience while studying abroad.
- 3. Students will integrate the academic material covered in pre-departure meeting with the field experience gained while in country.
- 4. Students will be able to identify significant Costa Rican historical events.
- 5. Students will be able to explain the geography, development & educational practices in Costa Rica.
- 6. Students will be expected to react with flexibility and independence to unexpected and unfamiliar circumstances they face during their study abroad experiences.

Assignments

Outside reading will be posted on Western Online that cover the history, culture, agriculture and business sectors of Costa Rica.

- 1. In Class Presentation. Each student will be assigned a topic related to the history and culture of Costa Rica. The student will then give a 15-20 minute PowerPoint presentation on the assigned topic in class. A copy of the PowerPoint needs to be submitted for final evaluation. Evaluation will be based on content and delivery.
- 2. Daily Reflective Journal Each day, students (while traveling including actual travel days) will write a reflective journal detailing, learning experiences, cultural understandings, positive and negative experiences of traveling and other relevant information. These journals will be reviewed and evaluated periodically on the trip. The evaluation will be based on sincerity, depth of reflection, insight provided, thoroughness and effort.
- **3.** Outside Presentation After returning to WIU, students will each develop a presentation to be given to an outside group (club, class, community group, etc.). Evaluation will be based on content and delivery. These PowerPoint type presentations will feature photographs taken on the trip.
- 4. Tour Participation While on the travel portion of the course students will be evaluated on teamwork, positive engagement, timeliness, cooperation, attitude, interest, and respect.
- 5. In Class Participation/Attendance. Regarding the campus component, students need to attend all classes. Any unexcused absence will result in a letter grade reduction in the course.
- 6. Final Reflective Paper. Upon return home, students will write a summary paper of the trip. This is to include what was seen and how it impacted you. The paper is to include personal thoughts and insights on your experiences what you saw, how the situation appeared to you, personal thoughts and insights, etc. This paper is to be more than just a travel log of dates, times and places --describe your feelings and thoughts at the time (thus the importance of good notes).

Excuses: Any excuse for a missed assignment must be cleared before the assignment is due. In general, the only accepted excuses will be for pre-excused official university events, personal health with a doctor's excuse, and verifiable family emergencies. Missed class: One class may be missed that meets the above stated standard – a make-up activity can be arranged to supplement the content missed. The makeup activity includes reviewing content and writing a report.
