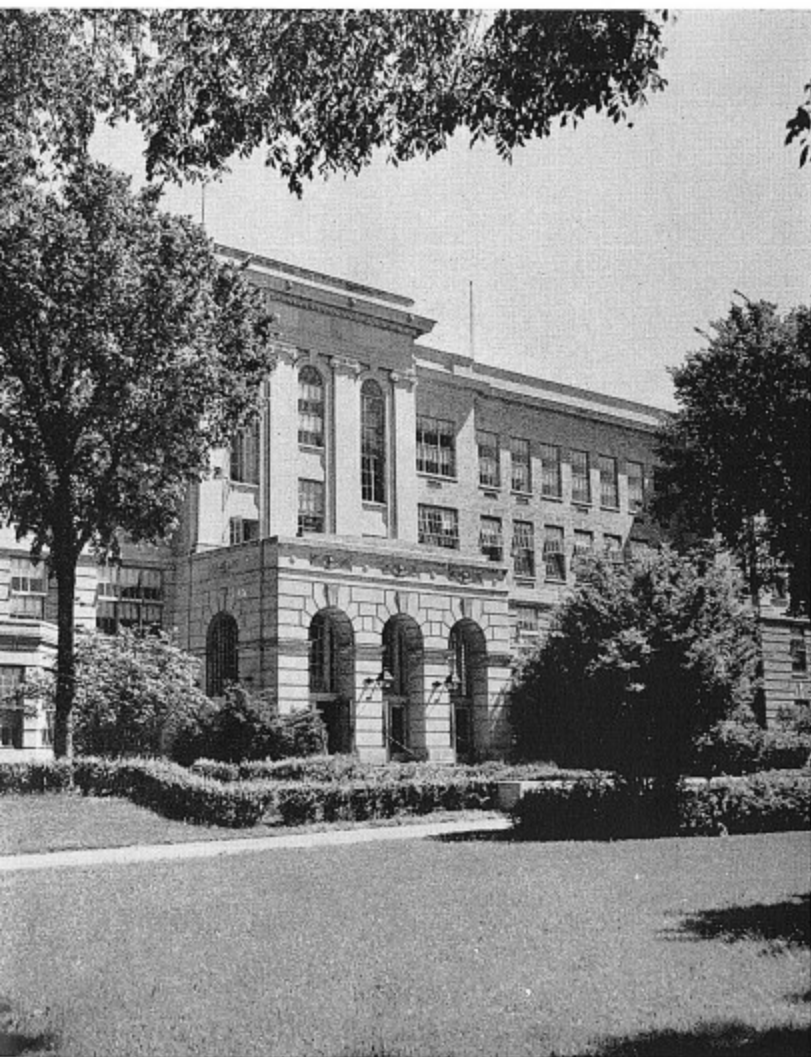
Introduction

Western Laboratory School was founded in September, 1902. The plans for this type of school were approved in April, 1902, by the faculty of Western Illinois State Normal. The Laboratory School was established to provide facilities for practice teaching for the Western Normal students.

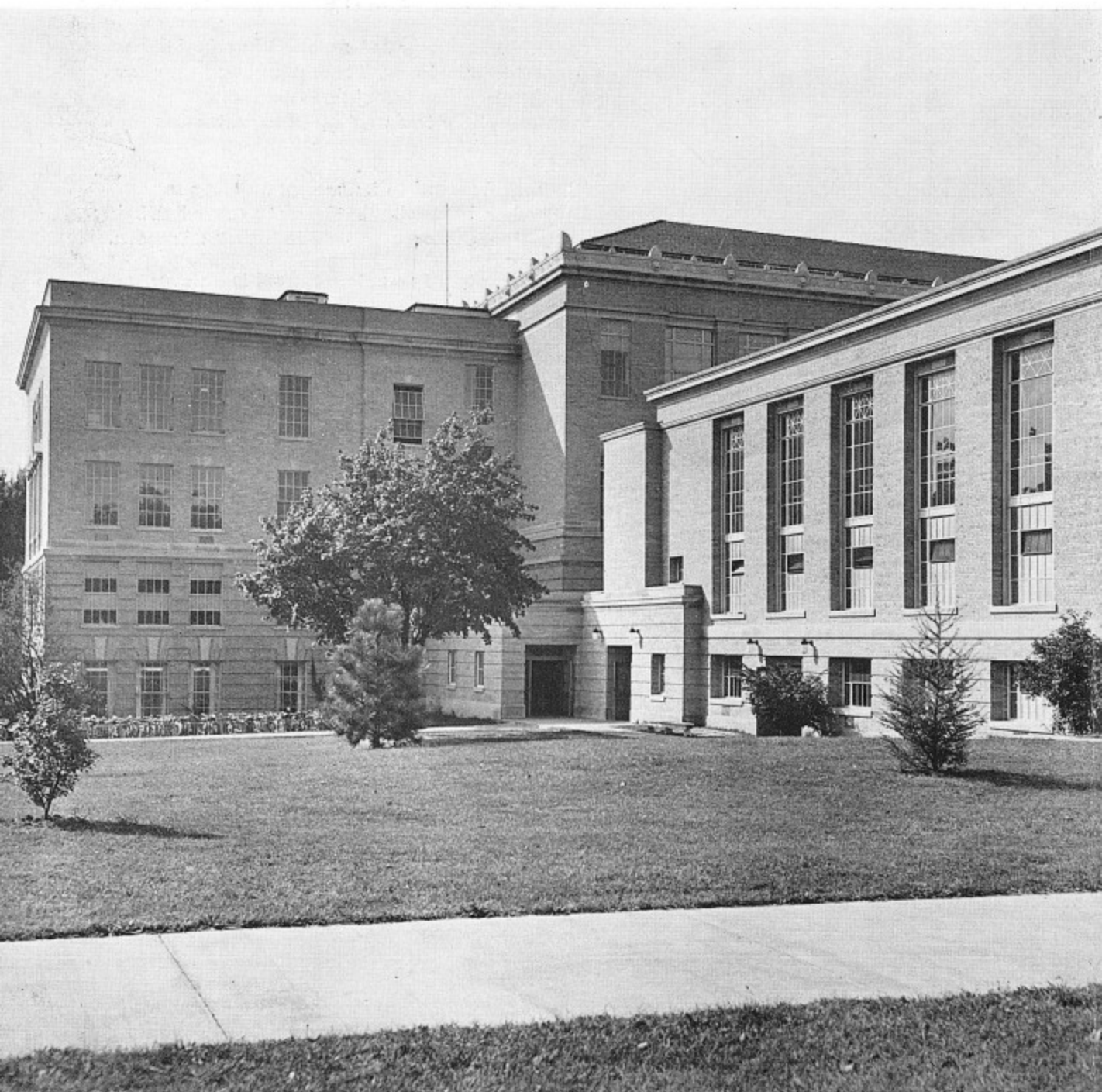
At the beginning the Laboratory School had three departments: primary, intermediate, and grammar. The faculty consisted of three teachers, with one of the three acting as head teacher of the school.

The school moved to its present building in September, 1933, with the present gymnasium being completed in time for the 1950-51 basketball season.

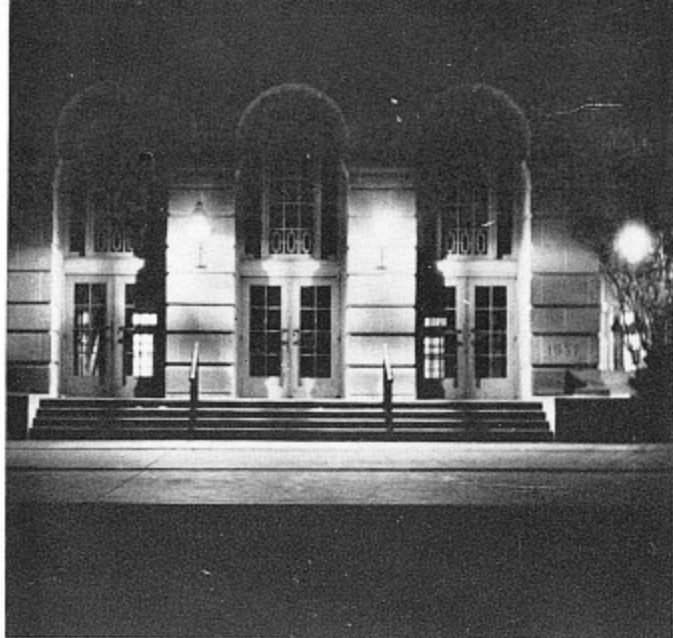
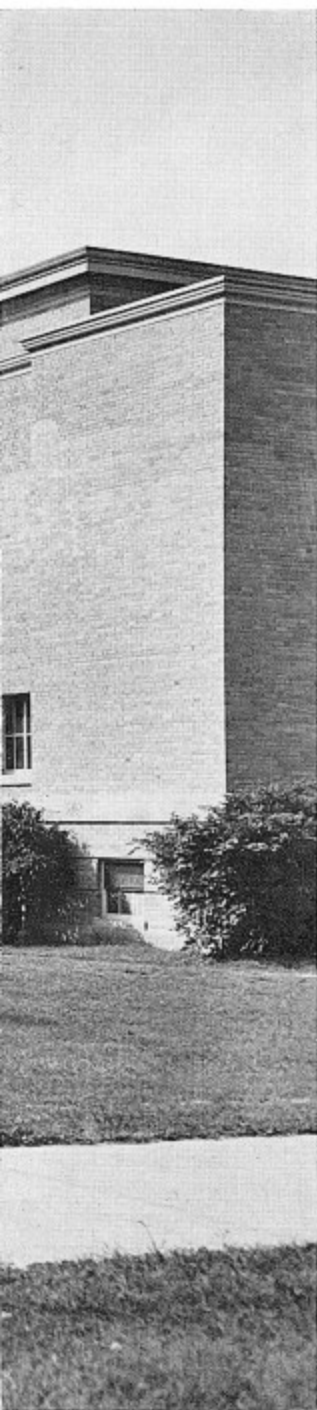
Today, Western Laboratory School is an ever growing institution providing the finest in educational facilities for students from kindergarten through grade twelve.

FACULTY

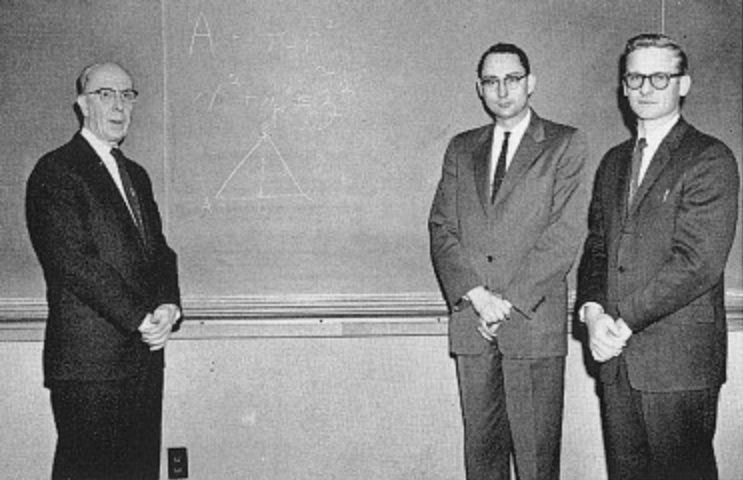
Great has been the growth of Western Illinois University Laboratory School in purpose and enrollment.

The enrollments have grown from a handful of pupils and three faculty in September 1902 to almost fifty faculty and six hundred and fifty pupils in September 1958.

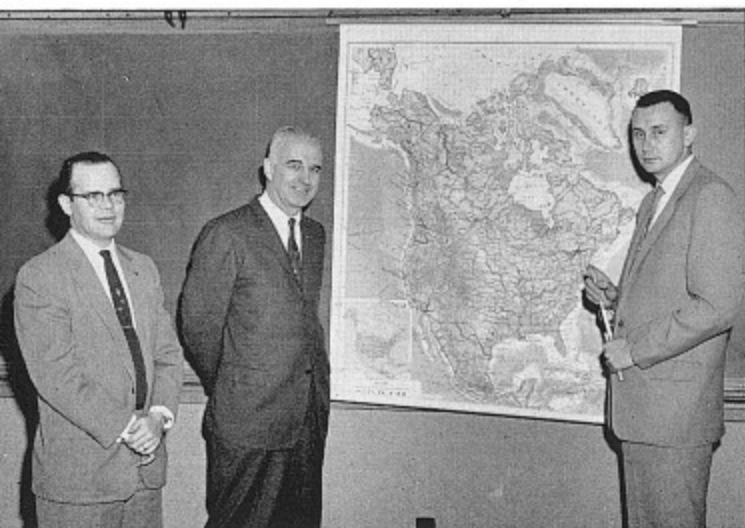
The purposes have grown from the original, which was "to provide facilities for practice teaching for the Normal School students," to the present purpose of presenting a laboratory for University students of education which would:

1. Exemplify the best practices for public education.
2. Provide observation and practice in which student teachers may acquire directed experiences in the art and science of teaching.
3. Provide opportunities for observing experimentation and evaluation in educational procedures.
4. Provide opportunities for the student to understand the school in its community relationships and to participate in community activities.
5. Provide opportunities for the investigation of educational problems.
6. Insure wholesome laboratory experiences for University students by functioning as an effective school for children.

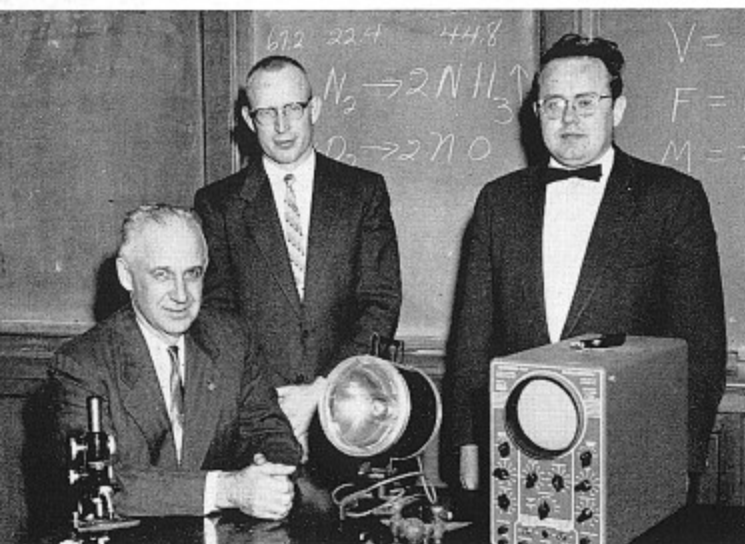

MEDICAL OFFICE STAFF

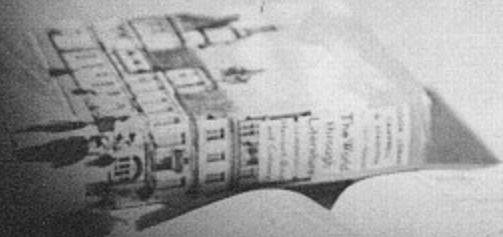
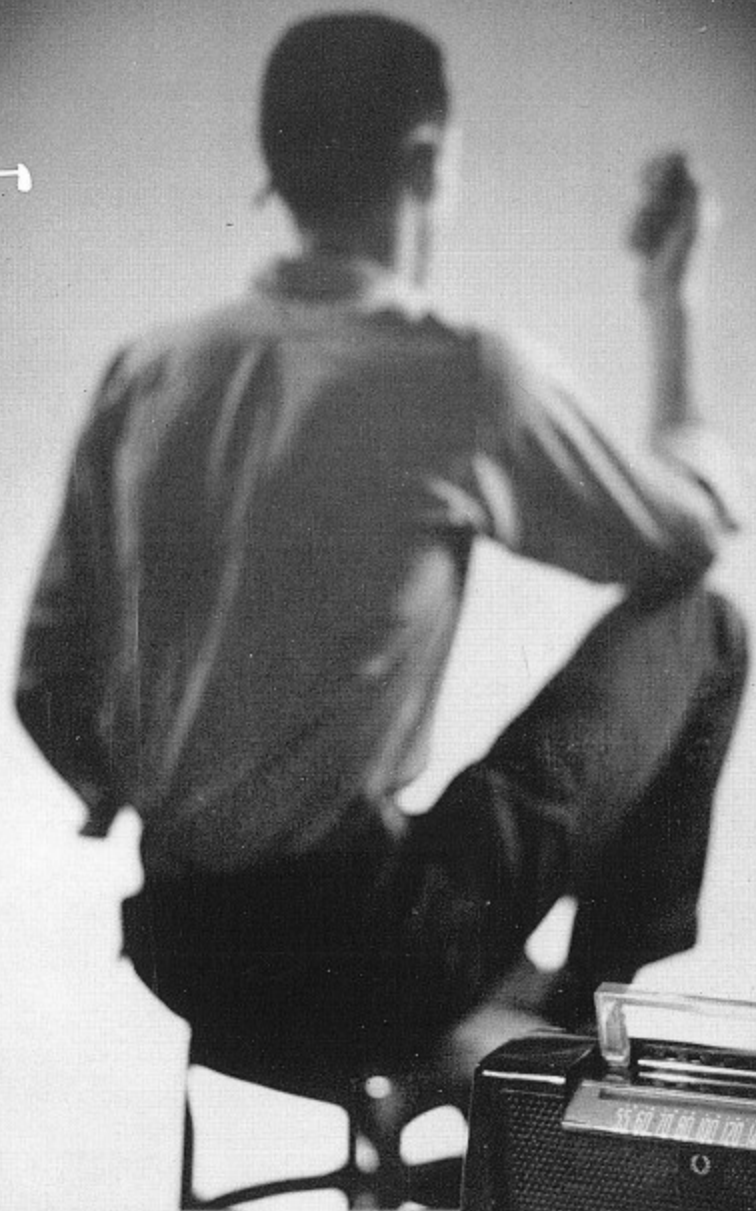

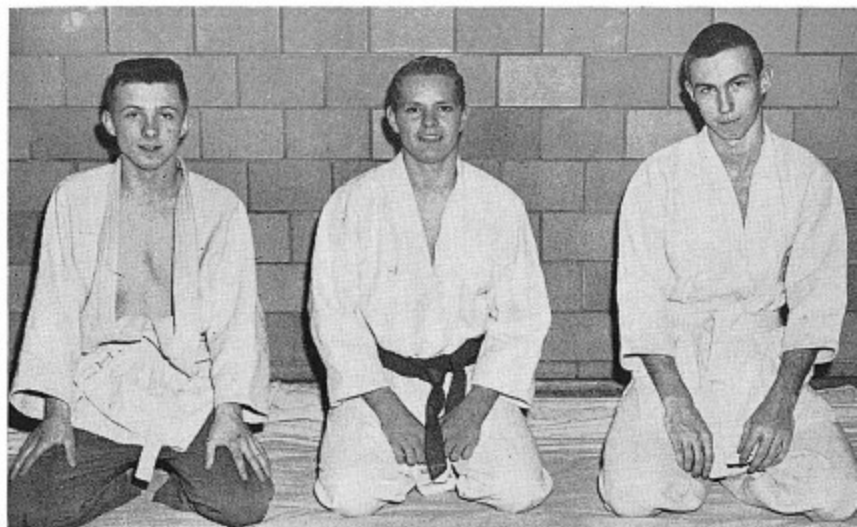


Judo

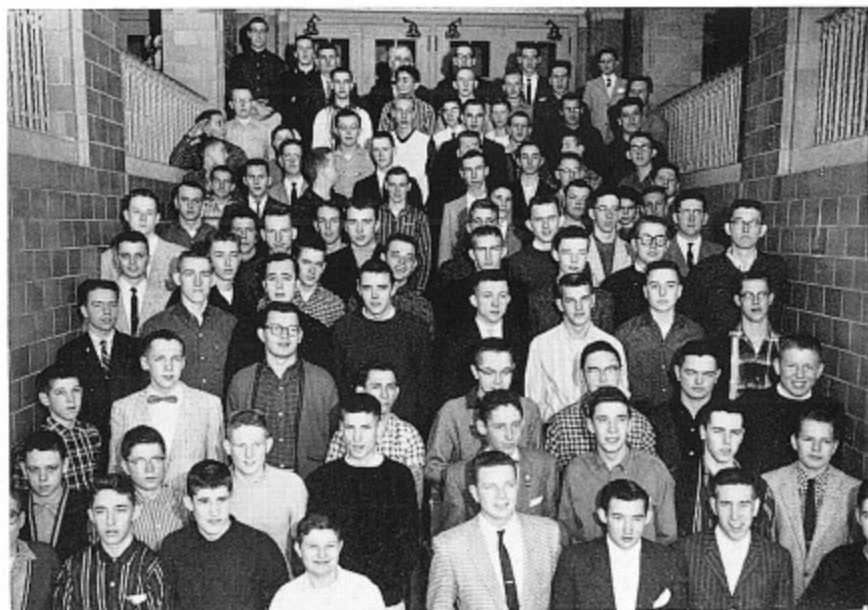

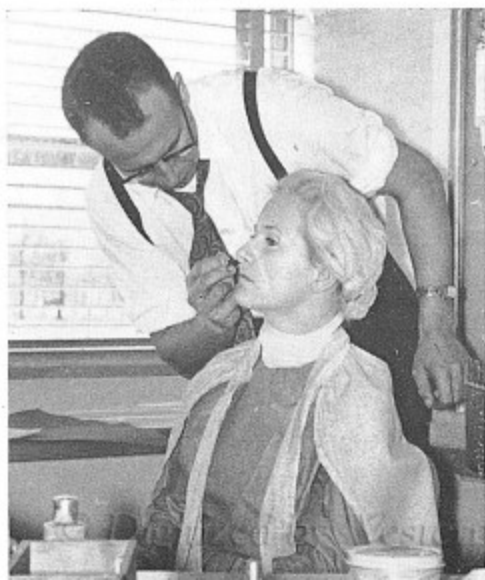

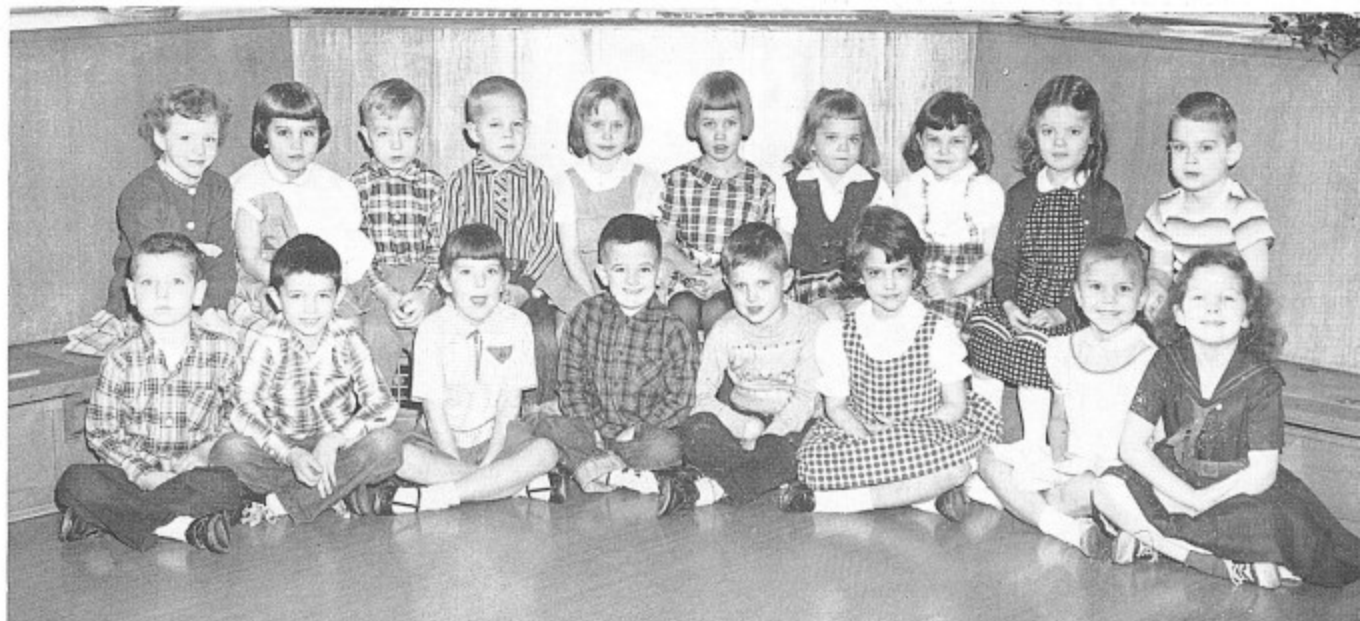
