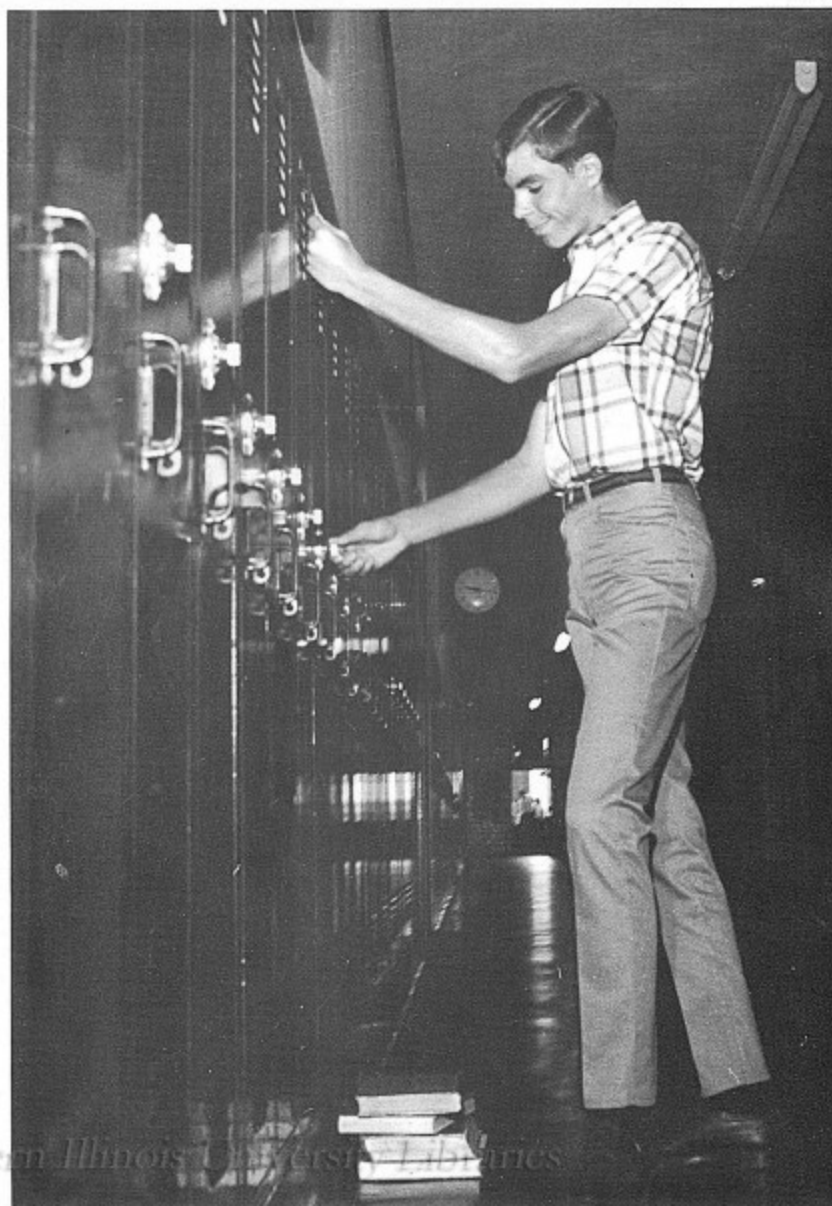

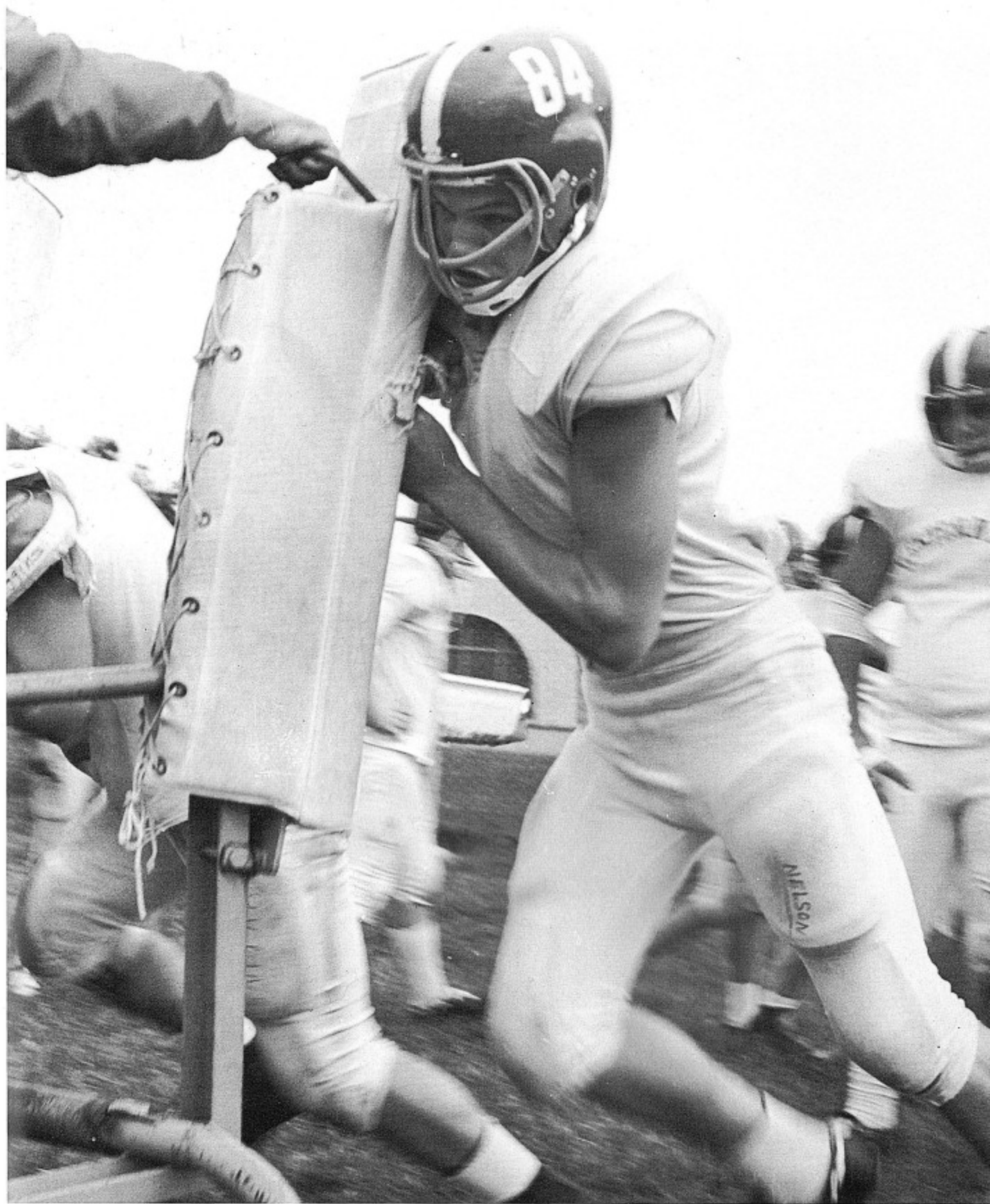

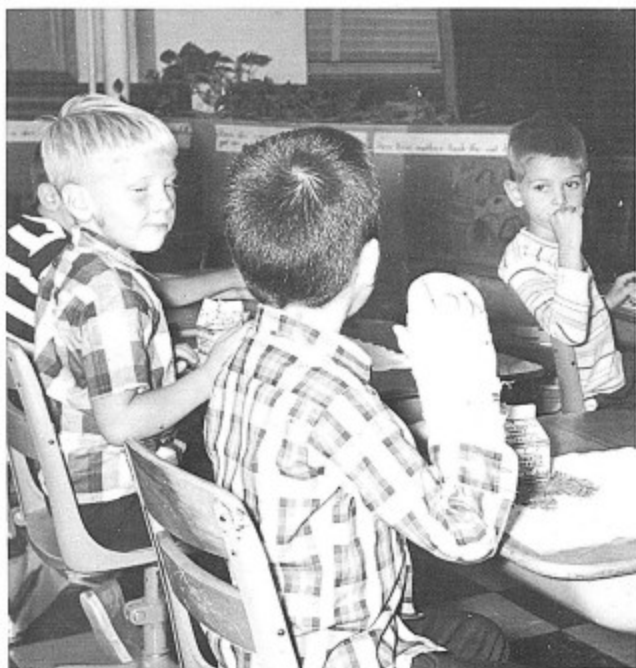

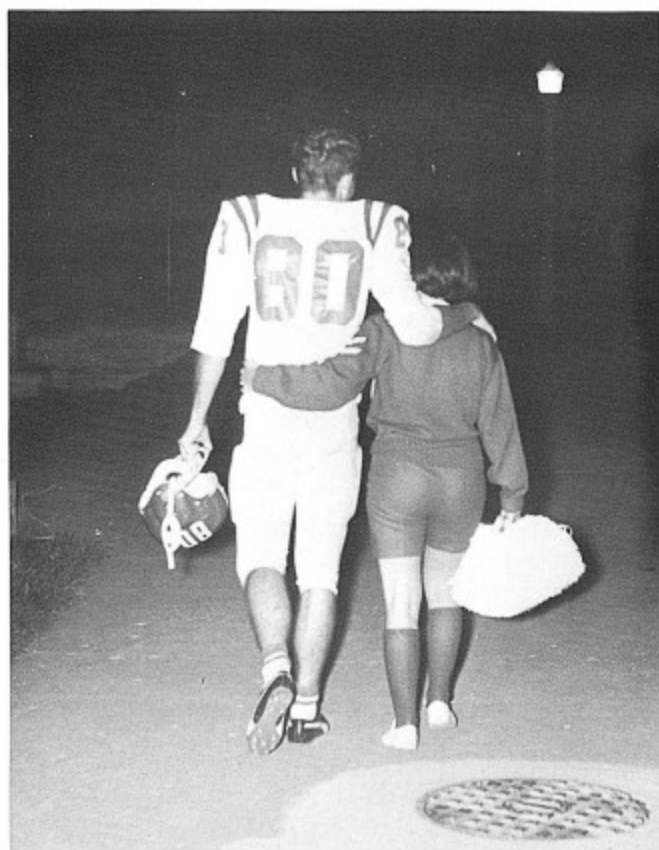

It's Homecoming!

Spirit, excitement, laughter and nerves — Homecoming this year at WHS was all this and more. The last time around for Homecoming in the old building set the theme "The Last Time Around" for the 1966 celebration. For the first time, Homecoming weekend became Homecoming week as students took part in activities ranging from October 10th to 14th. With the support of Western's student body, the Student Council was responsible for Homecoming's success. Under the supervision of Sponsor Mr. Alkire and Council President John Bolton, committee chairmen and class representatives carried out plans which had been in the making since early last summer.

On Monday, October 10th, the "Last Time Around" began with the election of royalty by students in grades 9-12. Royalty Chairman Pam Ricci supervised the "polls" which were decorated with a "Meet the Seniors" bulletin board; its purpose was to introduce to the student body Western's 47 seniors among whom 8 would be chosen for the royal court. As Monday ended, Pam was exploding with news of the voting results which couldn't be told before Thursday.

With Tuesday night came the Stunt Show, a new activity in this year's Homecoming. For two hours, students, parents, and faculty laughed as they watched skits given by various groups from the high school. The evening was climaxed by performance of a faculty skit featuring Mr. Alkire as "Super Teacher." The work of 10 black-robed stunt show judges was ended with the choice of the "Primates," Western's own Rolling Stones, as winners of the first-place trophy. Chairman for this event was Council member Debby Nicholson.

On Wednesday morning the student body proved that they could keep a secret by surprising Coach Sockler with an assembly in his honor. As Mr. Sockler was led to the stage by the WHS cheerleaders, the curtains parted to show Mrs. Sockler and ten of the coach's former players. During the program, Emcees Kathy Riggins and Allen Fritschel introduced the players who were given the chance to reminisce about their parts in some of the many Sockler victories. Sockler Day Chairman Bob Schwartz presented gifts to Mr. and Mrs. Sockler on the part of the entire student body. The assembly ended with an official proclamation that October 12, 1966, would be declared Coach Harry Sockler Day at WHS.



By Thursday, everyone was moving with Homecoming spirit which was heightened even more by the traditional Homecoming assembly. The program began on a tense note as students awaited the announcement of this year's royal court. After the naming of these 8 seniors, King Don Cay escorted Queen Debby Nicholson to the stage where the couple began their reign over Homecoming 1966. It was now time for Assembly Committee Chairman Steve Knowles to introduce the day's speakers.

Students heard from Mr. Horrabin, Dr. Knoblauch, Dean Abel, members of the honor class of 1957, and Coach Harry Sockler. Then, the audience was aroused by Coach "Rock" Hanson's annual Homecoming pep talk. With the sound of the noon-hour bell, the 1966 Homecoming assembly was over. Next on the agenda? A contest down on Hanson Field between the undefeated Western Cardinals and the Carthage Blueboys!

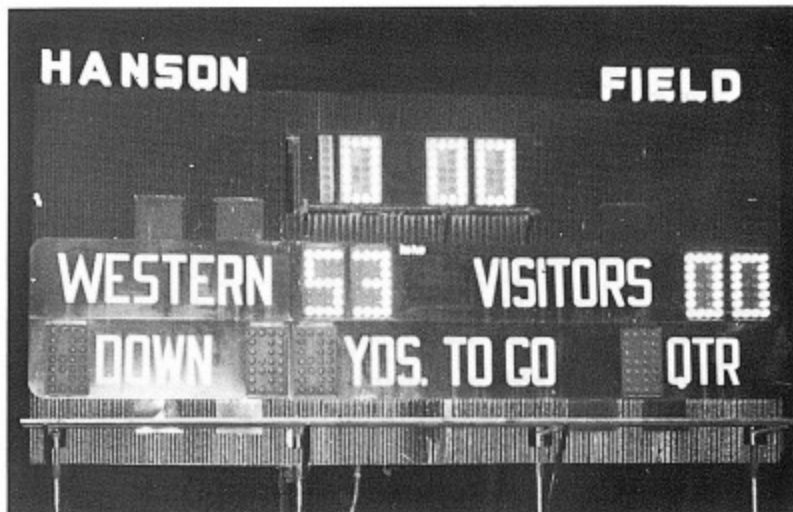




Cards Post Homecoming Victory



Flanked by the fully-uniformed members of the WHS band, the Western Cardinals entered the field through a crepe paper hoop — one of the Pep Club's Homecoming contributions. Near the sidelines, parents of the senior players waited to present the boys with their helmets as part of a pre-game ceremony which honored senior cheerleaders, players, and their parents. From the cheers that could be heard at the 8 o'clock kick-off, it was apparent that the crowd was ready and waiting for a Homecoming victory. This victory seemed assured by half-time when the marching band presented their Homecoming show featuring songs from *The Sound of Music*. It was to the sound of this music that the 4 convertibles bearing the royal court passed the stands. The players returned, the game resumed, and the Cardinals won by a score of 53-0, lengthening the Cardinal winning streak to 13 games. As Coach Sockler was once again lifted to the shoulders of "his" boys, the last home game was over, and thoughts began to turn toward Friday's Homecoming Dance.

The decorations were pretty "tuff"! The refreshments were good! The band was really cool! But if any Student Council member were asked, he could tell you about getting up at 7 A.M. to decorate - and about moving all the study hall chairs down four floors to the gym - and about blowing up 1200 balloons with compressed air, from the chemistry lab. It's doubtful that Dance Chairman Lois Krong would even want to remember the frustrations of that day!

However, the dance seemed to justify a day of hard work. Students were welcomed to the dance by a lighted sign on which the theme, "The Last Time Around," was written. When not dancing, there was room for relaxing at tables surrounding the floor, and the gym walls were covered with reminders of the days in this building which have led up to "The Last Time Around."

At 10:30, Pam Ricci and Bob House took their places in front of the band and prepared to welcome

the crowd and present to them the 1966 royalty. As they were introduced in alphabetical order, the girls of the court, carrying long-stemmed roses, took the arms of their royal escorts and approached the throne. After 1965 Queen Patty Nixa had crowned Queen Debby, and Ray Quintiliani, member of last year's royal court, had presented King Don with a gold football, the King and Queen left their thrones to lead the coronation dance.

With the crowning over, and only half an hour of dancing left, the last time was nearing its end - and it ended with a bang, as the Rising Sons played the most appropriate popular song possible - "The Last Time"!

The counting of votes, a funny skit, a surprise for Coach Sockler, a red and white mum, and a pair of discarded shoes lying amidst pairs of dancing feet - this was Homecoming 1966.

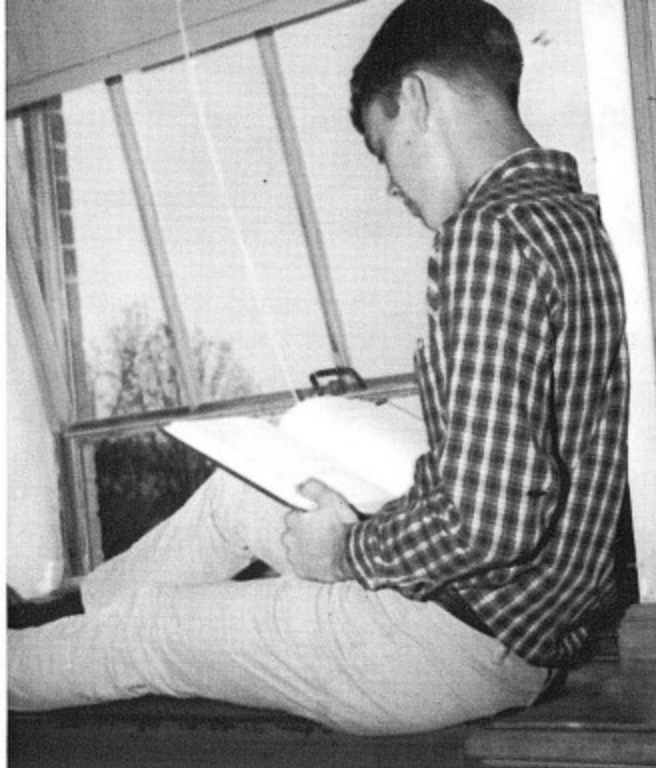

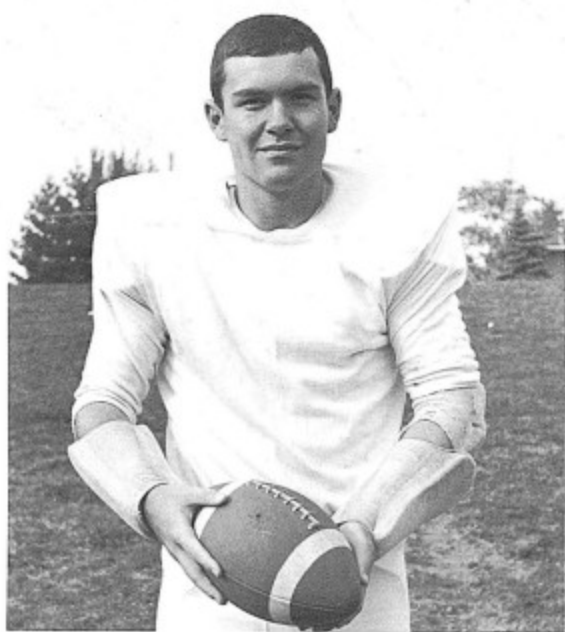


Tom Pollard takes time out to "bone up" for his P.S.A.T. The Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test is given to juniors each fall.

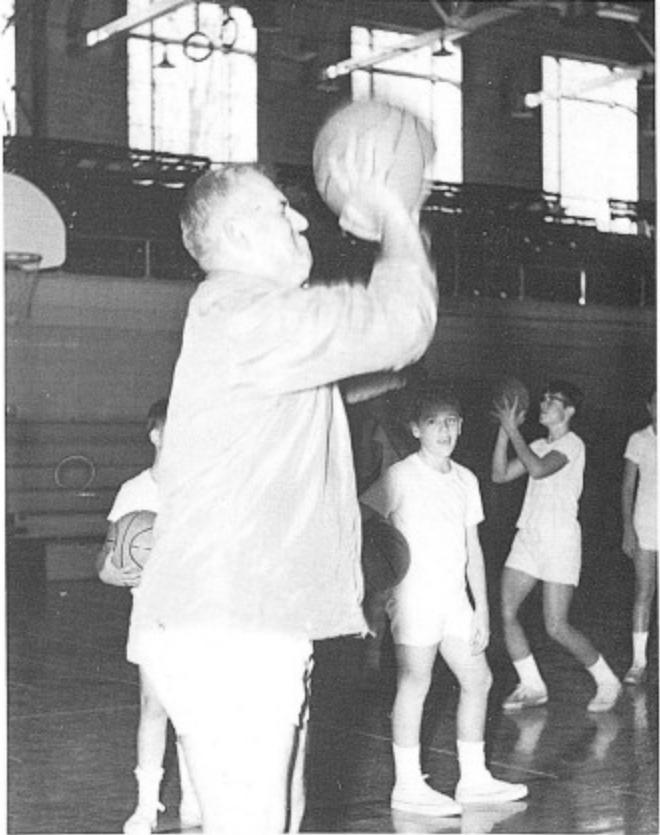
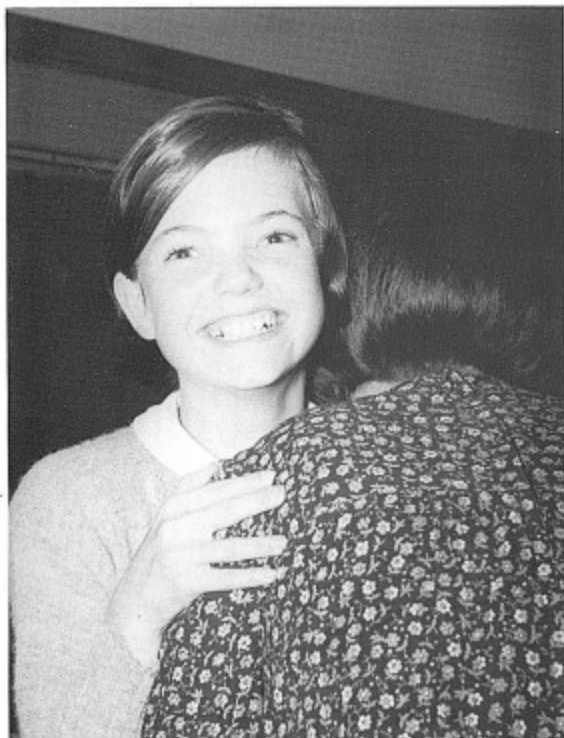


Football Is Over . . .

This year each senior has chosen an activity in which he wants to be photographed individually. These boys focused their interest on football. Greg Carson (above), Don Cay (above at right), and Doyle Brookhart (pictured with Coach Karas at right), were all key men in Western High's undefeated football team. Carson's rushing average of 8.2 yards per try earned him a spot on the first-string Little All State team.

For the second year in a row, the Cards had an 8-0 season. Highlights of the year included the win over Knoxville which gave Coach Sockler his 100th victory at Western. By scoring 53 points in the final game of the year, the Cards set a new scoring record of 41.2 points per game while the defensive team held their rivals to a single touch-down per game.





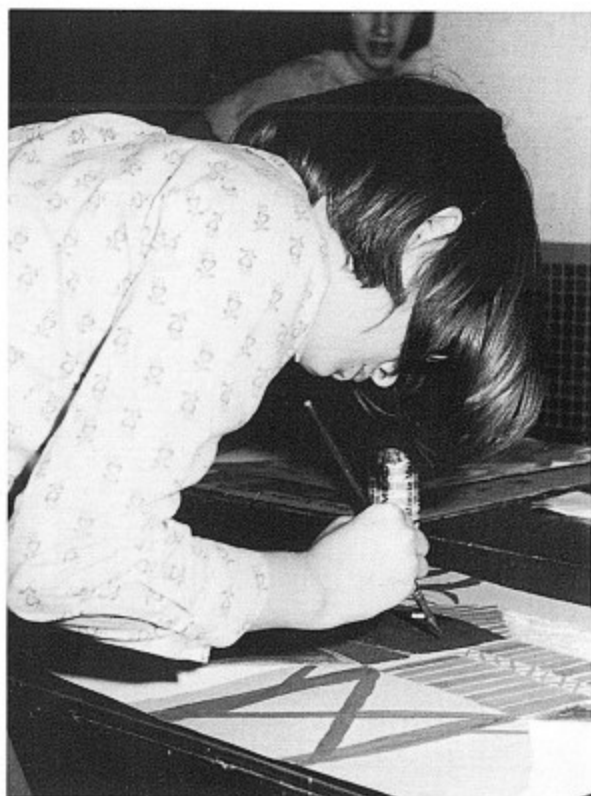

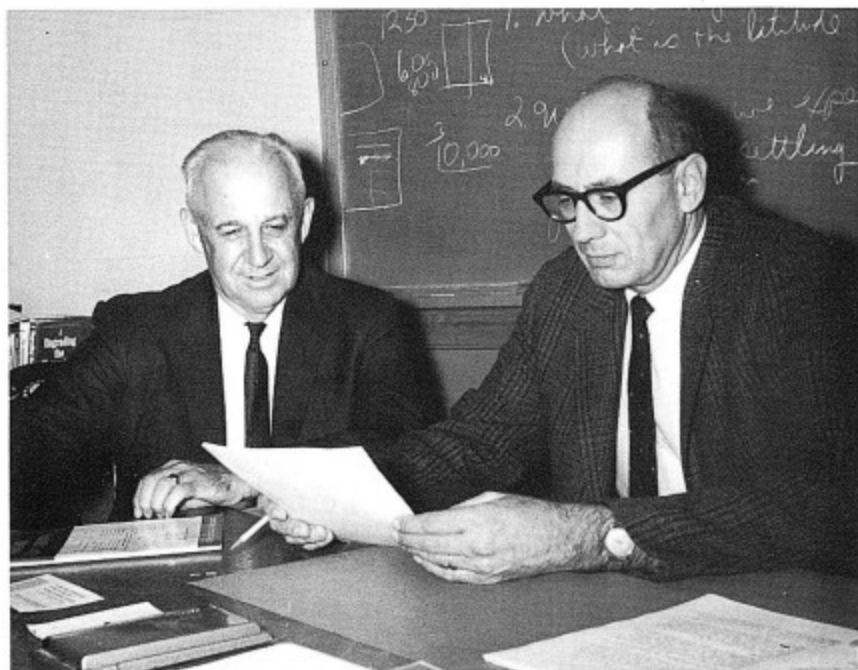


Work at Western Continues Long After the Closing Bell

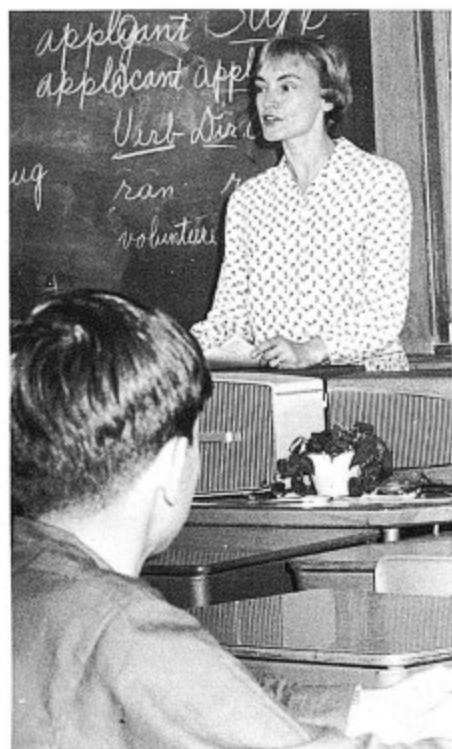

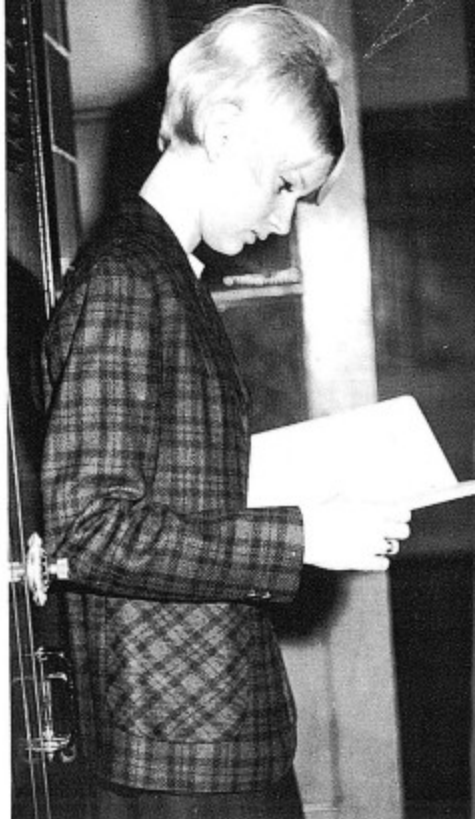

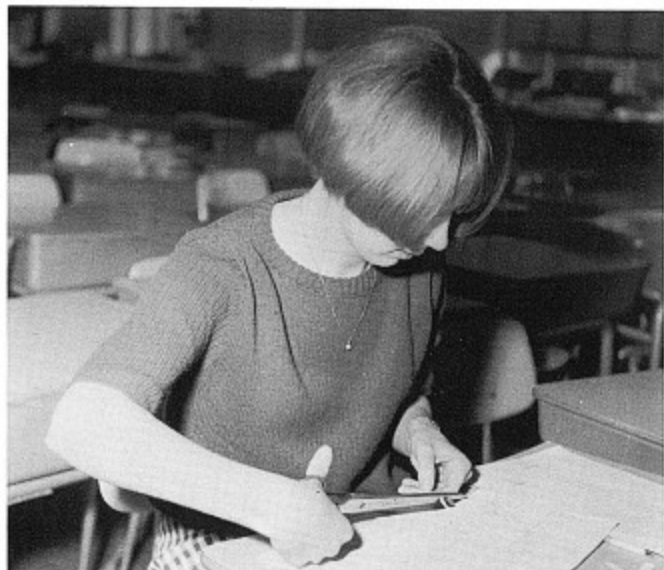

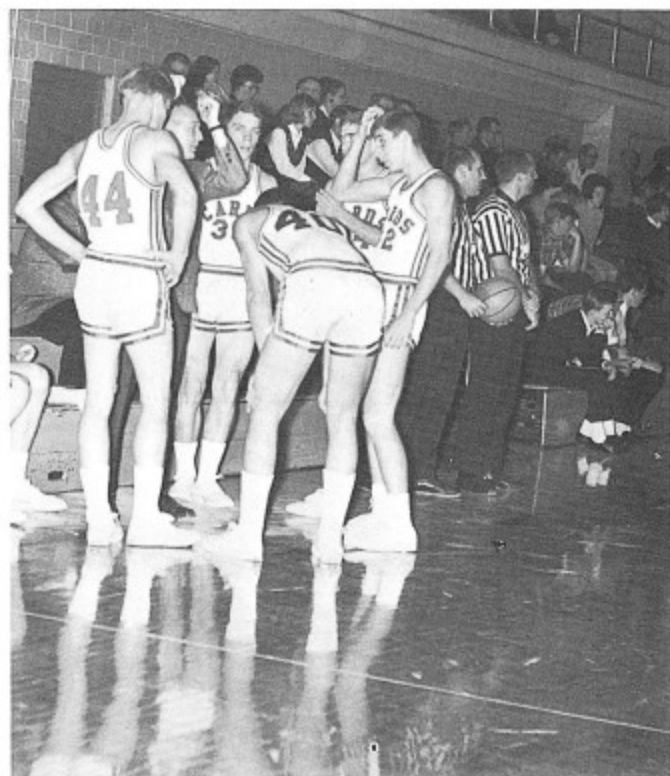

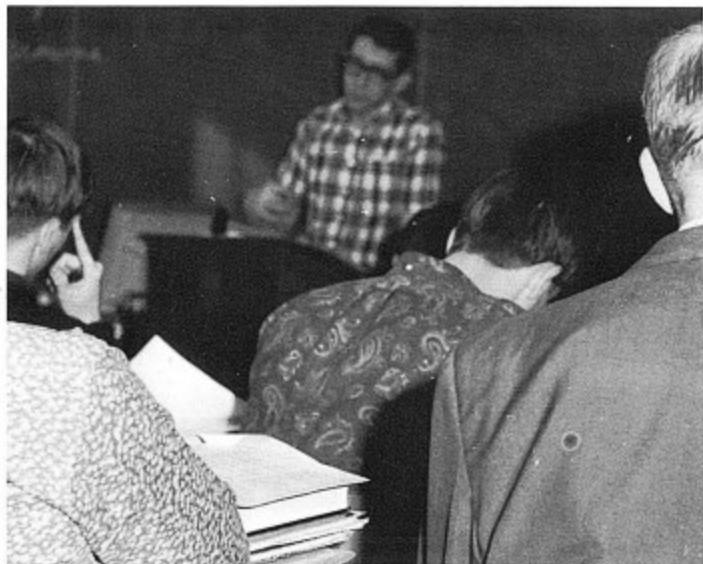

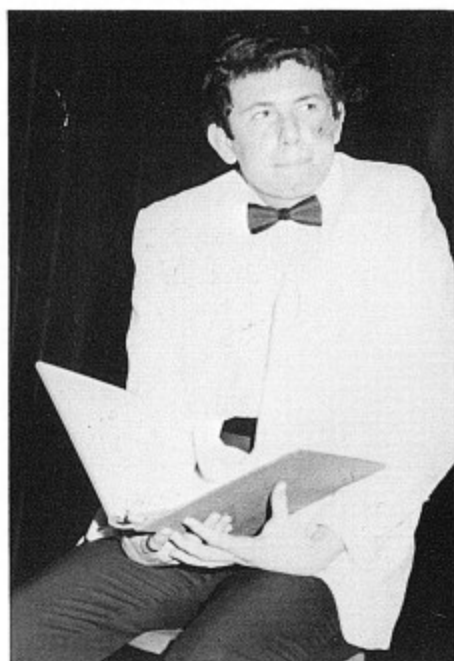

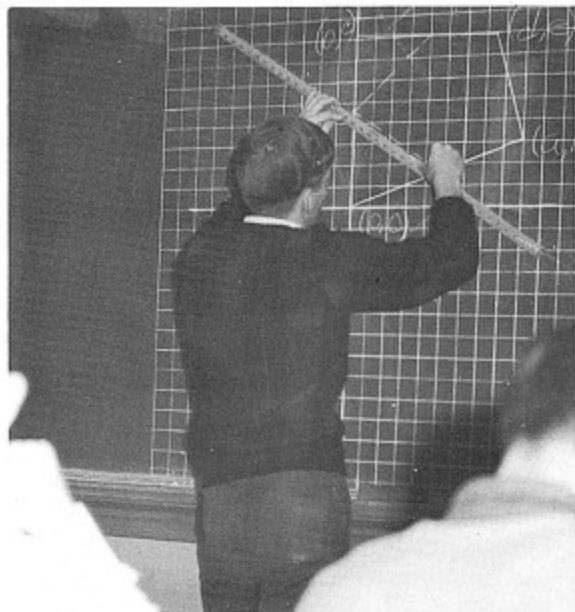

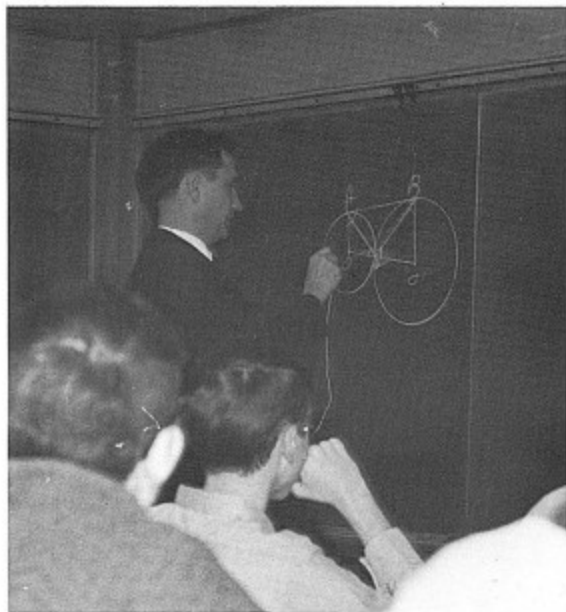

Western Goes for Math in a Big Way

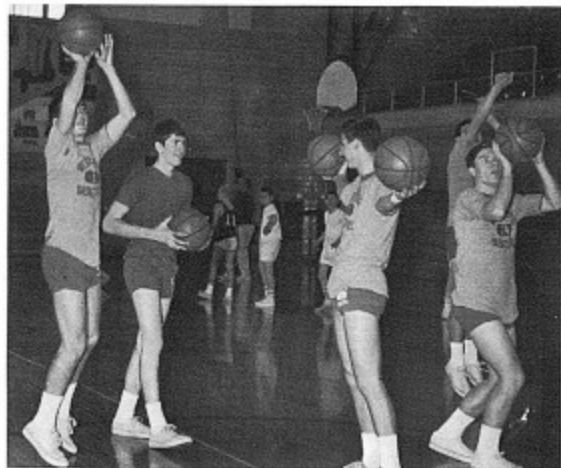

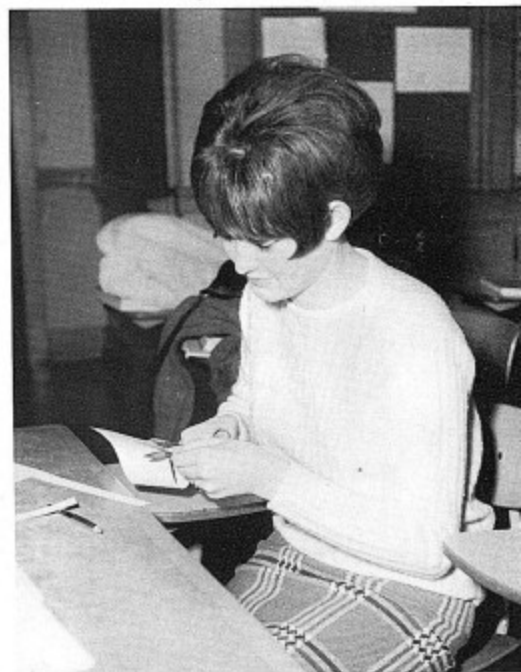

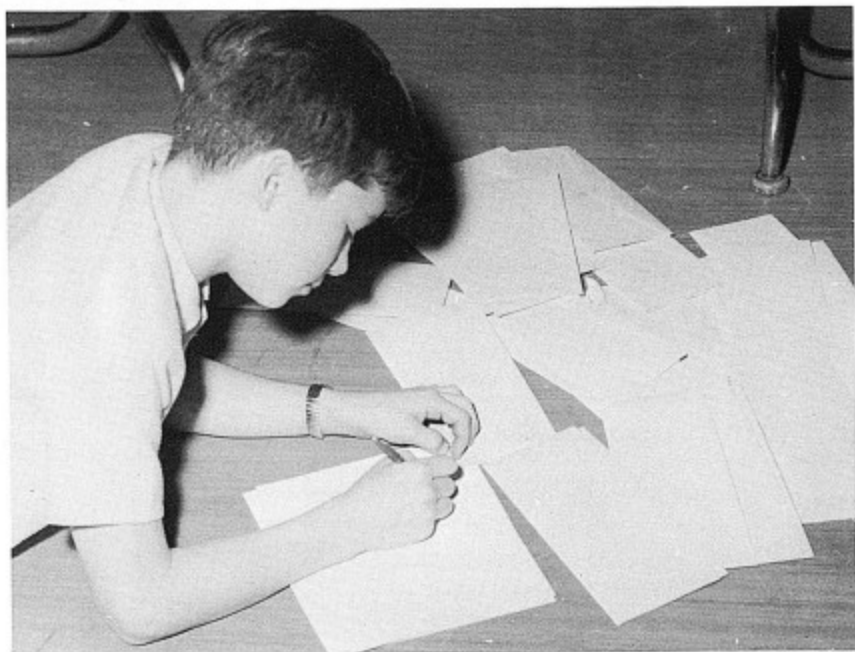

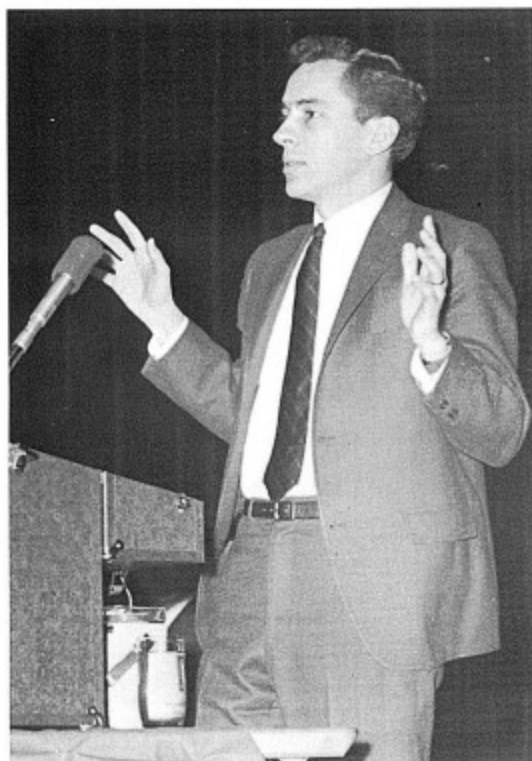


Dr. Budd Speaks at Quill and Scroll Assembly

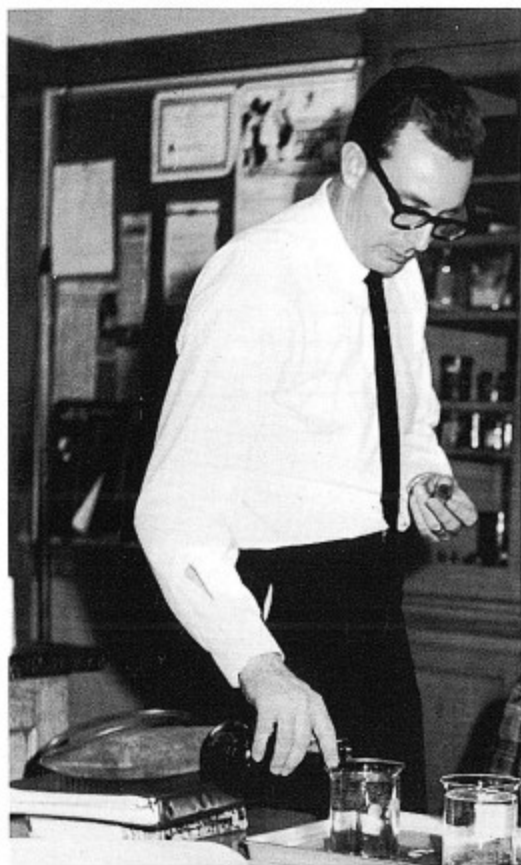

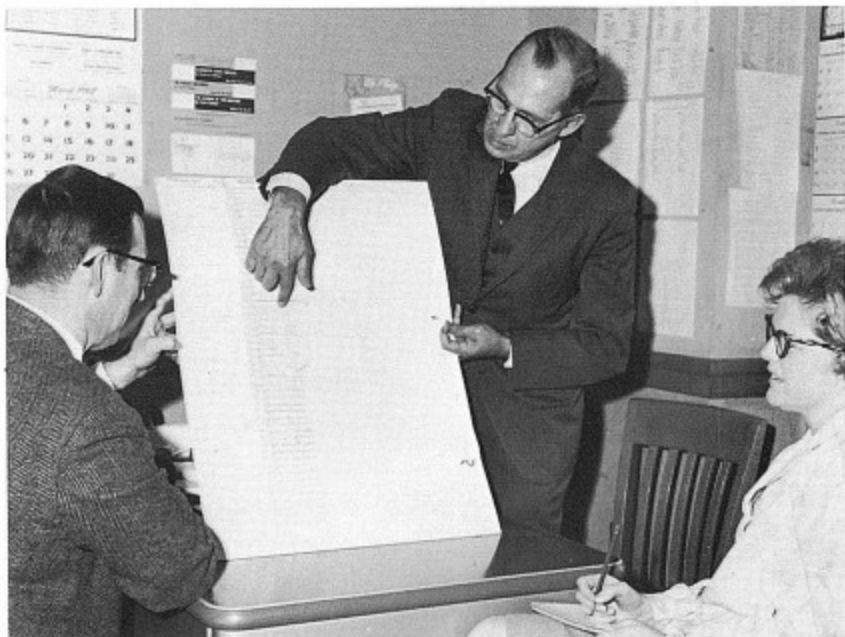

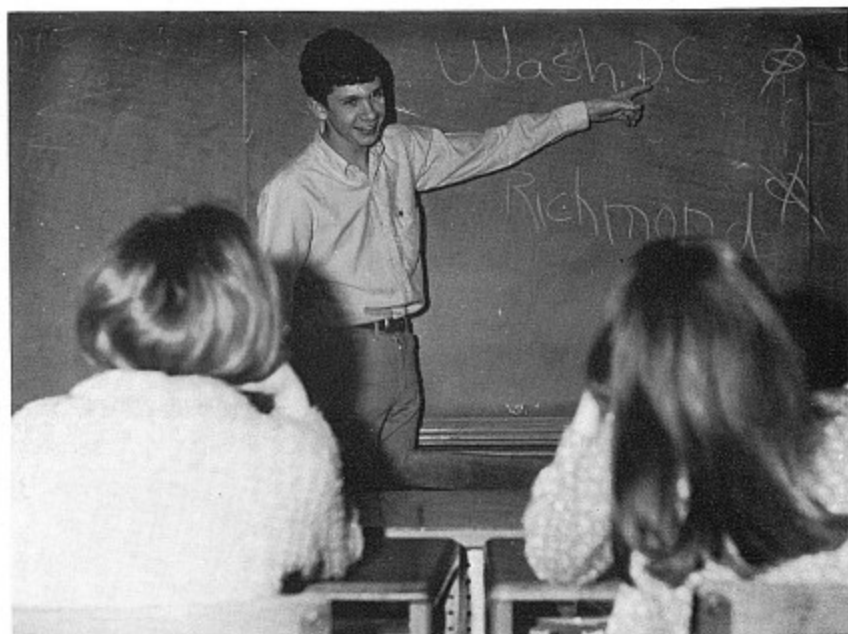

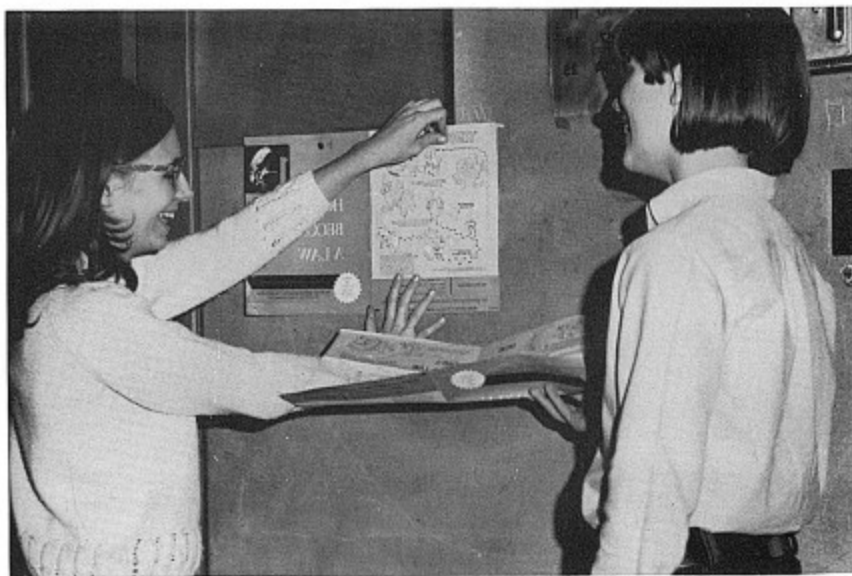

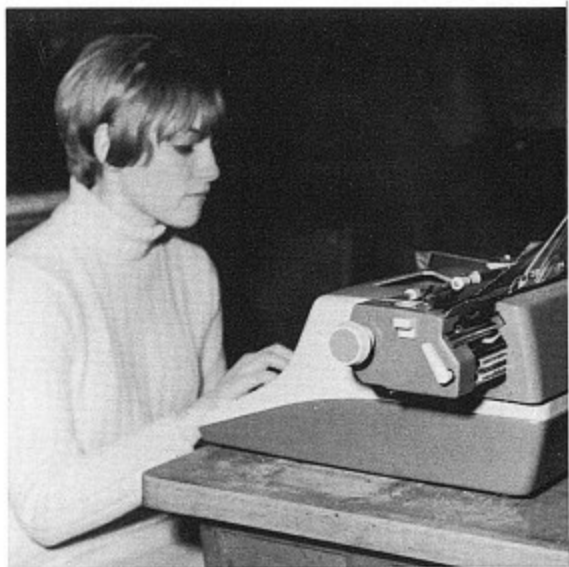
Stressed at the Campus School

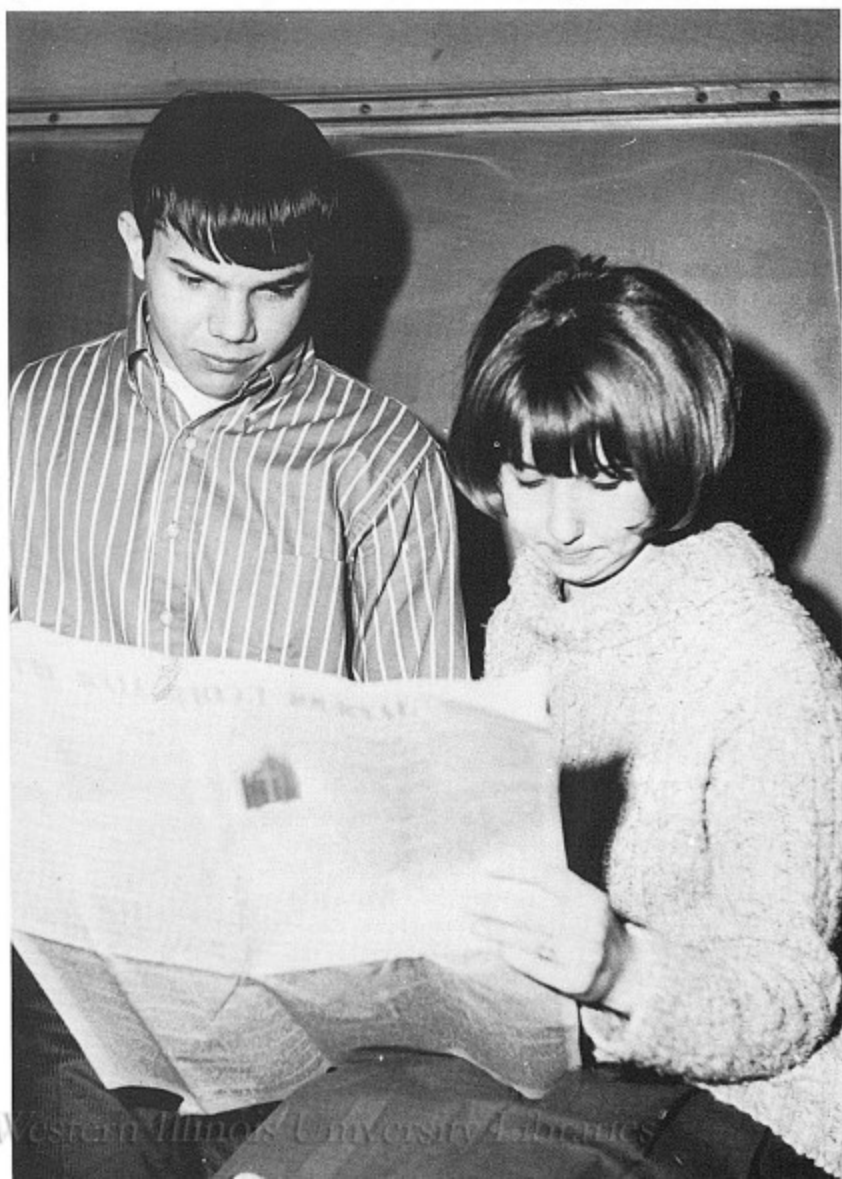

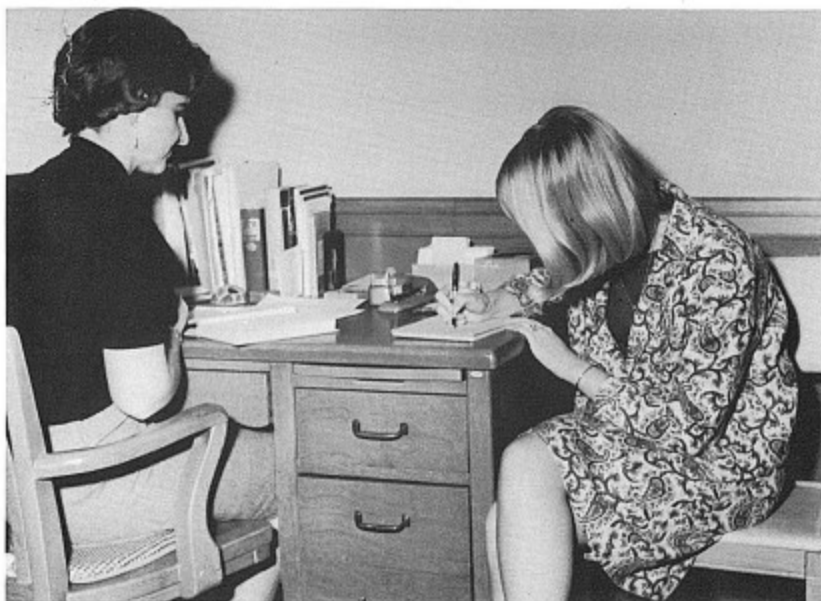

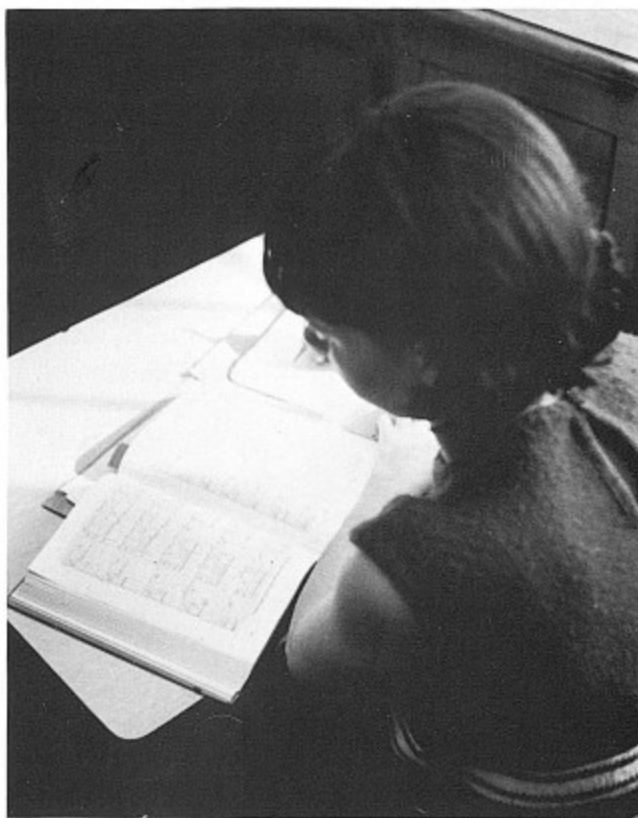

General Business Knowledge Is Accented at WHS

WHS has to its credit a well-developed business curriculum. Through such courses as typing, shorthand, bookkeeping, and clerical practice, skills necessary for entry into various business fields or for future formal education are learned. 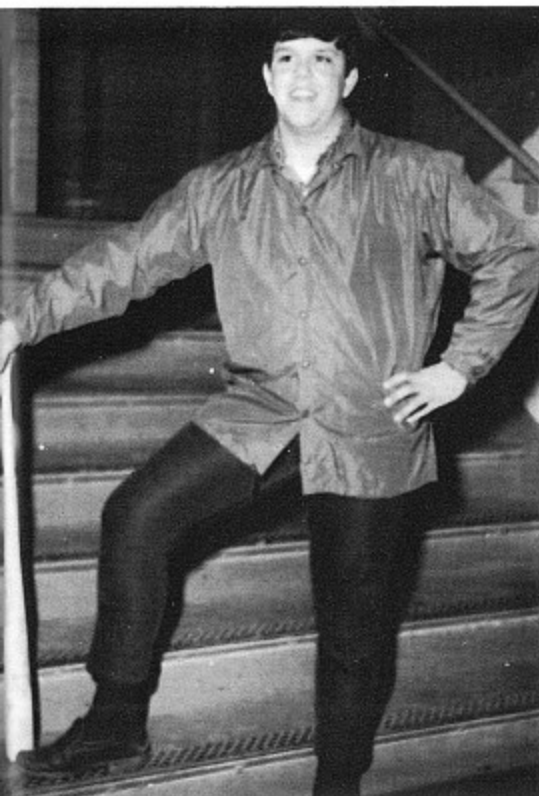

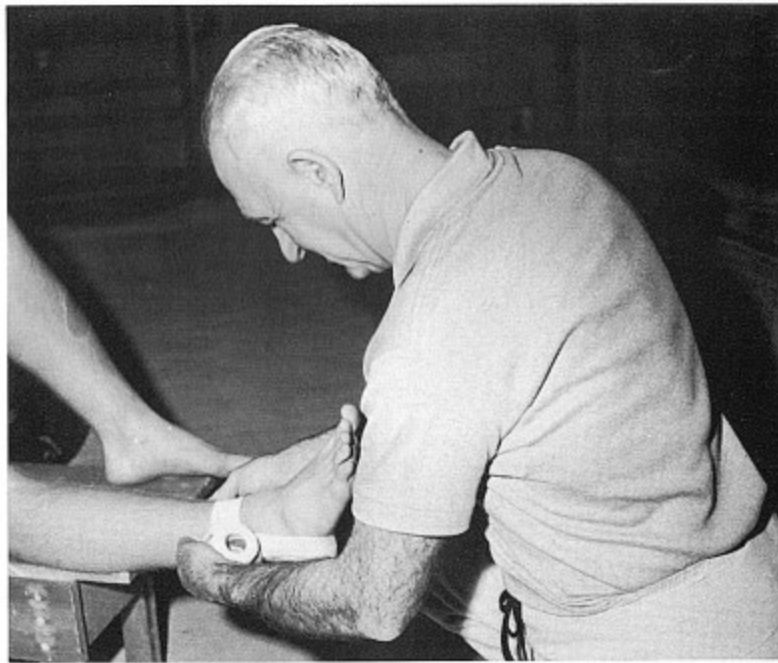

Western Reads

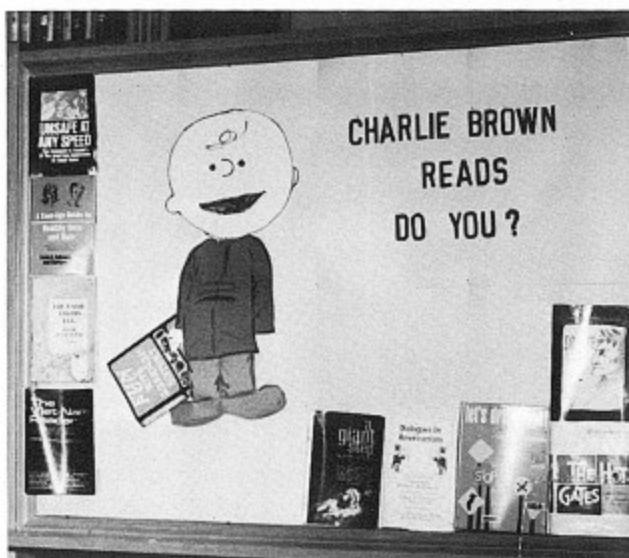
Reading is for everyone! Reading classes, as a part of every student's curriculum, begin in the first grade and continue through the sixth grade.

The final phase of elementary school reading classes is the SRA Program, used in the fifth and sixth grades. This program, by Science Research Associates, emphasizes speed and comprehension. Although the formal reading classes do not continue after the sixth grade, enthusiasm for reading is kept alive by junior high and high school teachers, Tri-Mu, and the Reading Center.

The use of the SQ3R technique for reading is encouraged by high school teachers. The principles of this program, read, survey, question, recite, review, all make for better comprehension and retention of material for assignments and pleasure reading.

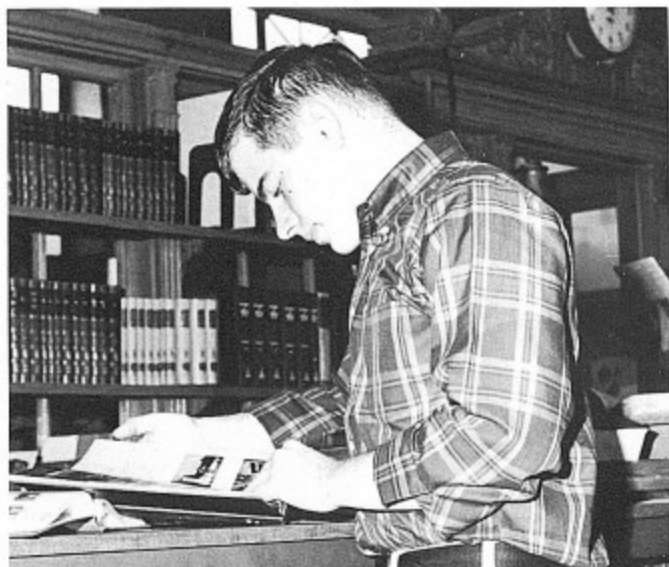
There is never a lack of good reading materials with two libraries. They are well-equipped with a total of over 20,000 books and a wide range of periodicals and pamphlets.

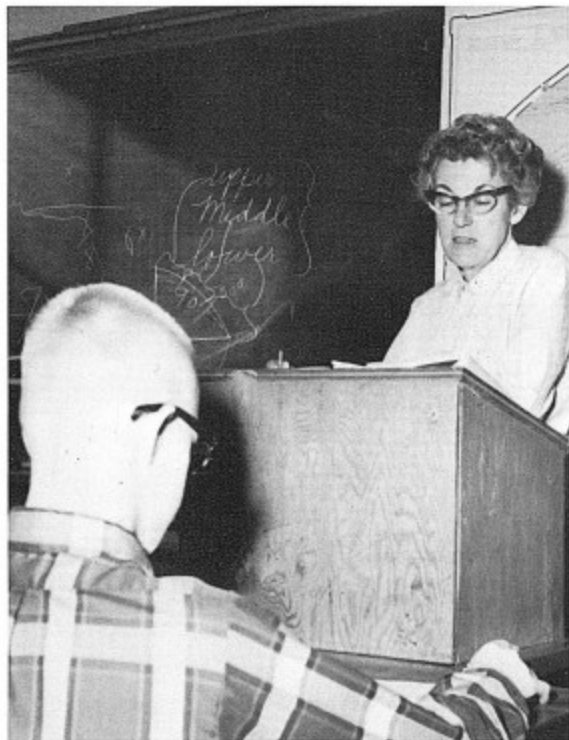

The language program consists of Latin and Spanish. Latin is a high school course while Spanish begins in the fifth grade and continues through the upper grades. The study of Latin starts with concentration on the history of Rome and its role in the development of the language. Spanish is taught somewhat differently from Latin. Since it

is a conversational language, students begin by learning names of familiar objects and then speaking these words in sentences. The use of records, tapes, and the WIU language lab enables the student to delve as deeply into the language as he wishes.

Mr. James' classes are conducted only in Spanish.

Ed Chapman, Chuck Hommel, and Bryant Julstrom were selected to attend the Science Symposium at the University of Iowa in March.

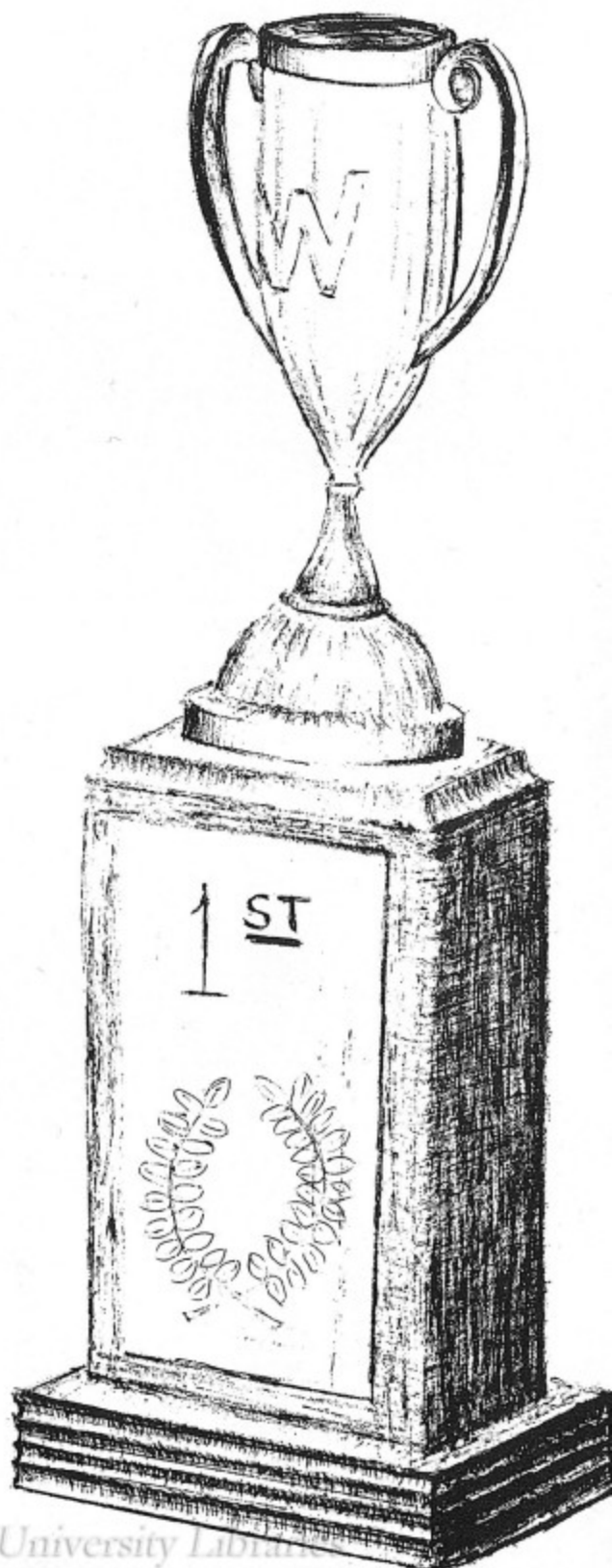
In May, Debby Nicholson and Allen Fritschel were chosen queen and king by the Junior Class to reign over the Prom activities.

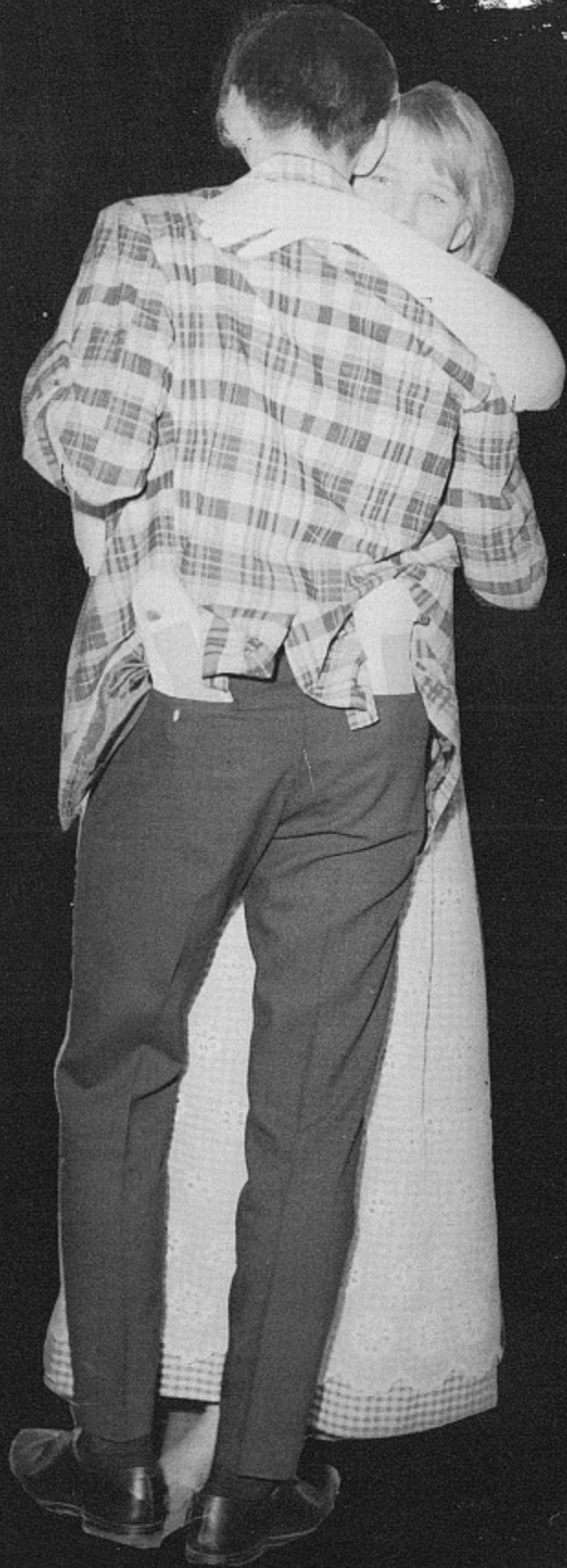

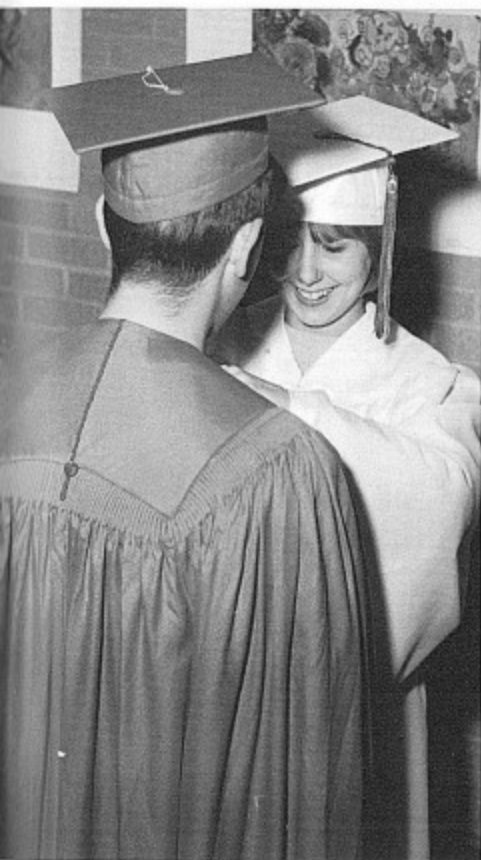

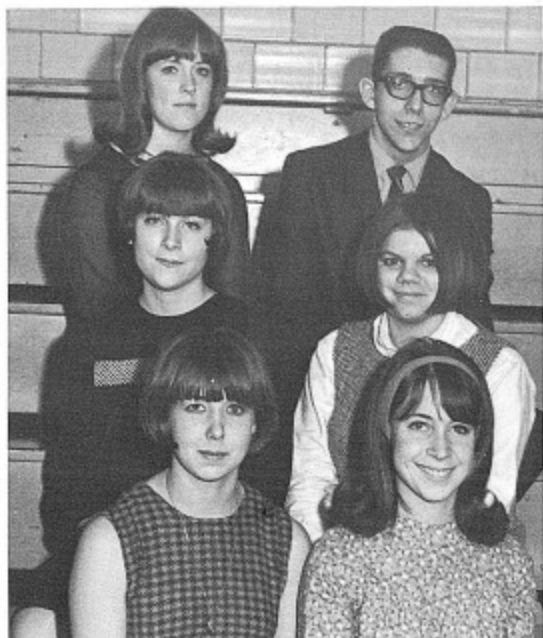

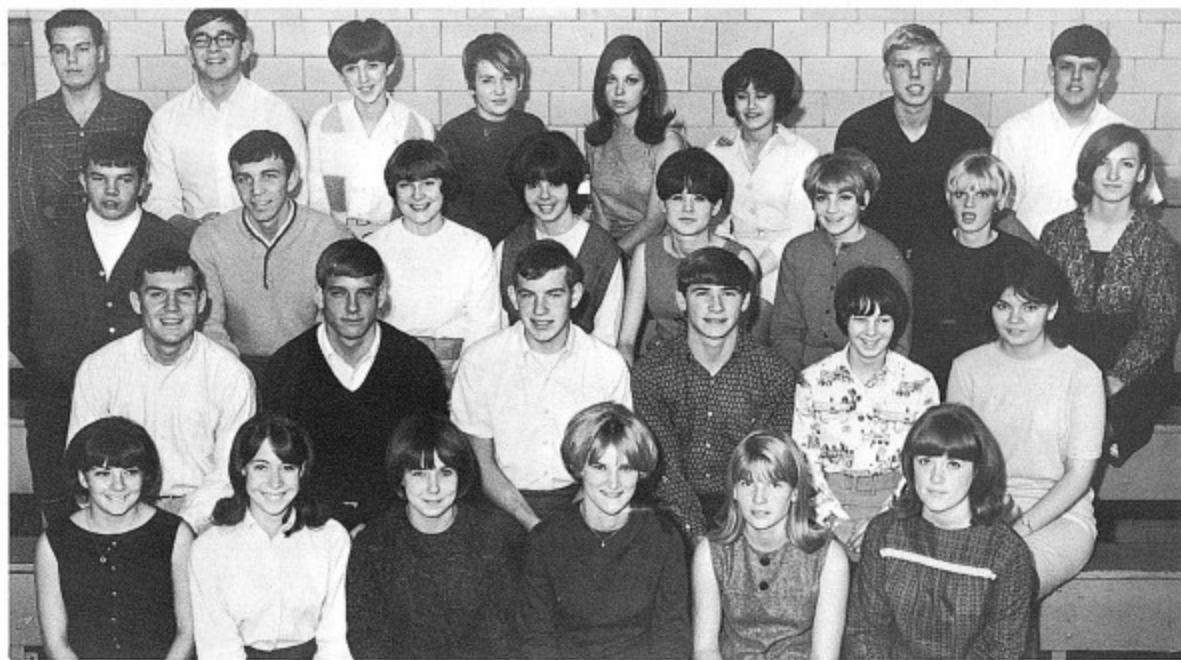

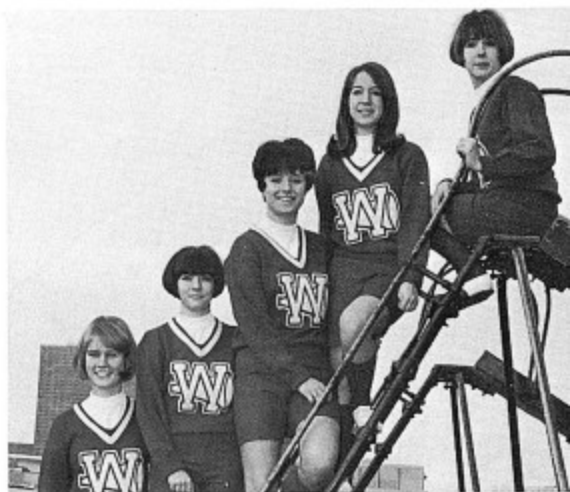
Cheerleaders Back Redbirds

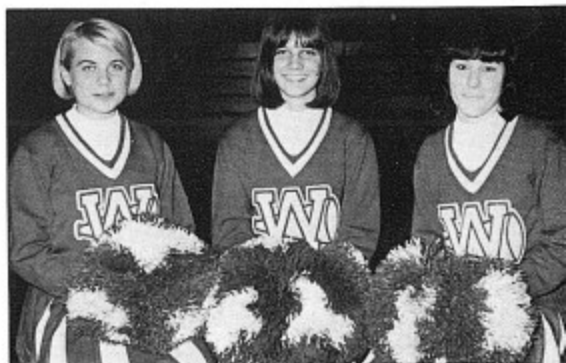

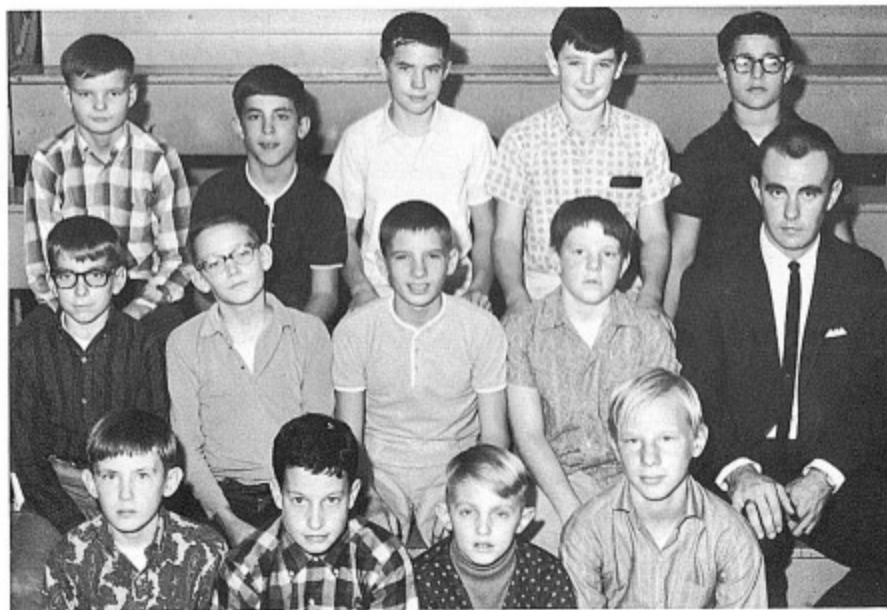

Senior Grade Average Climbs Yearly

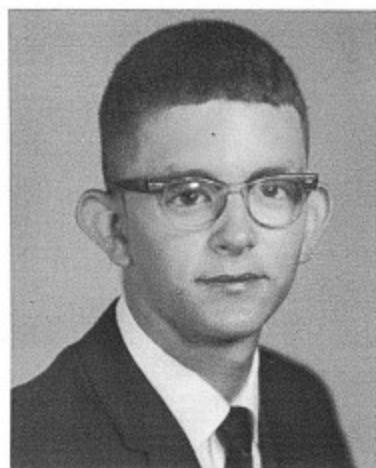
