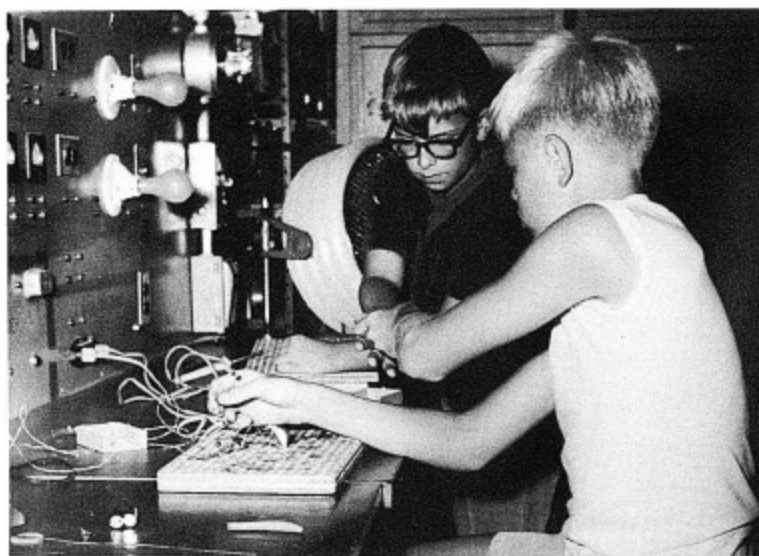

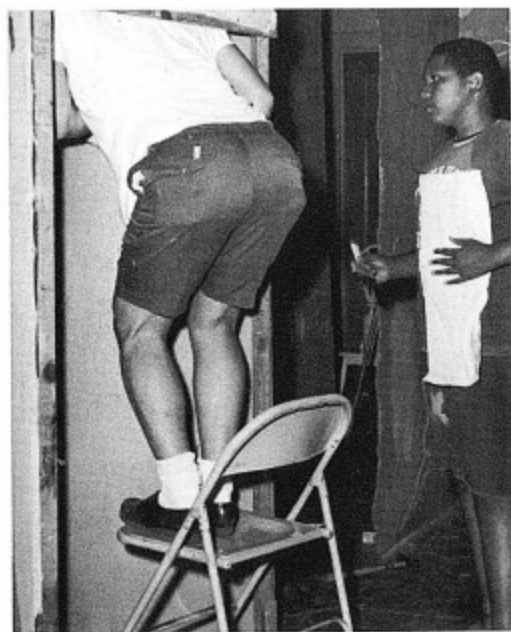

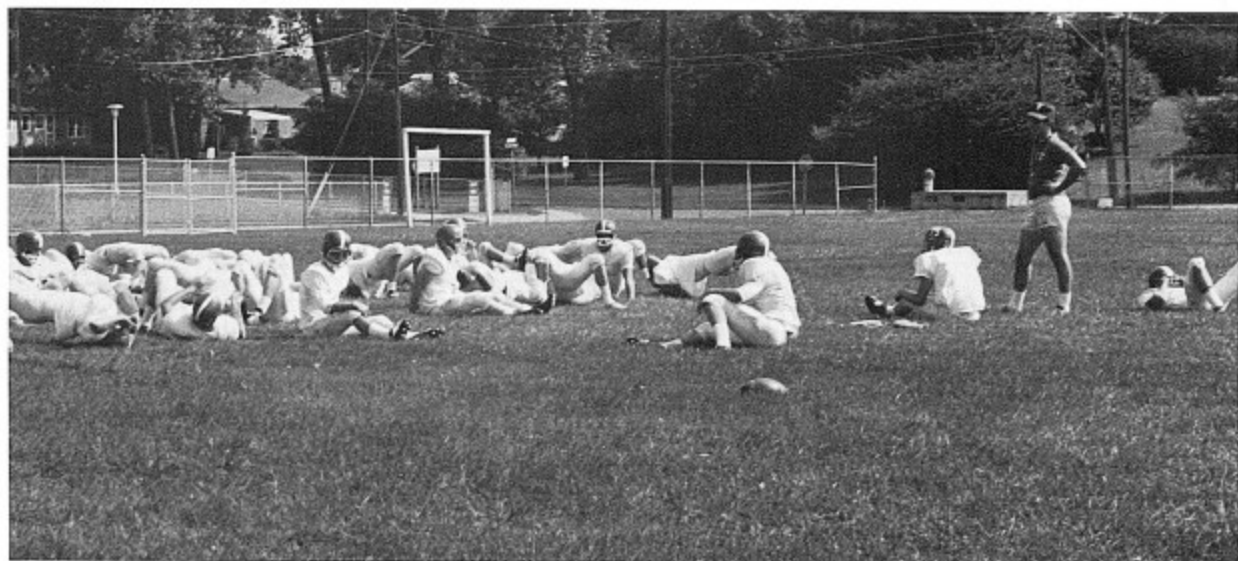

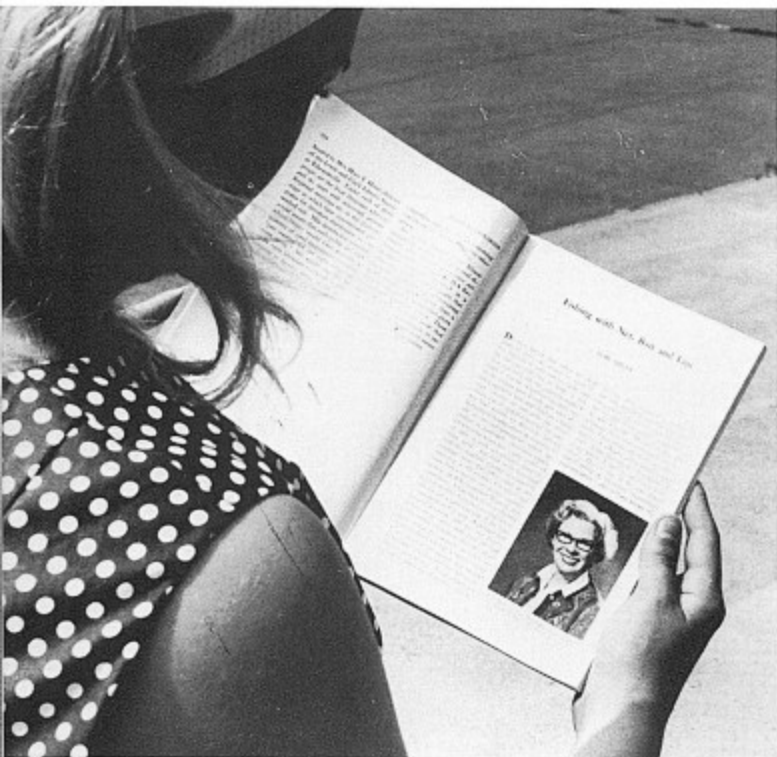

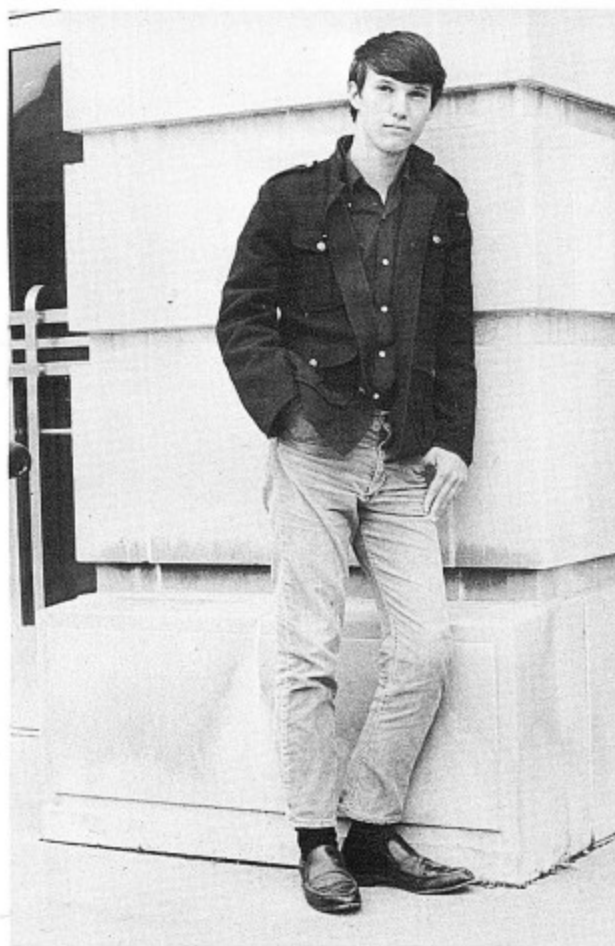

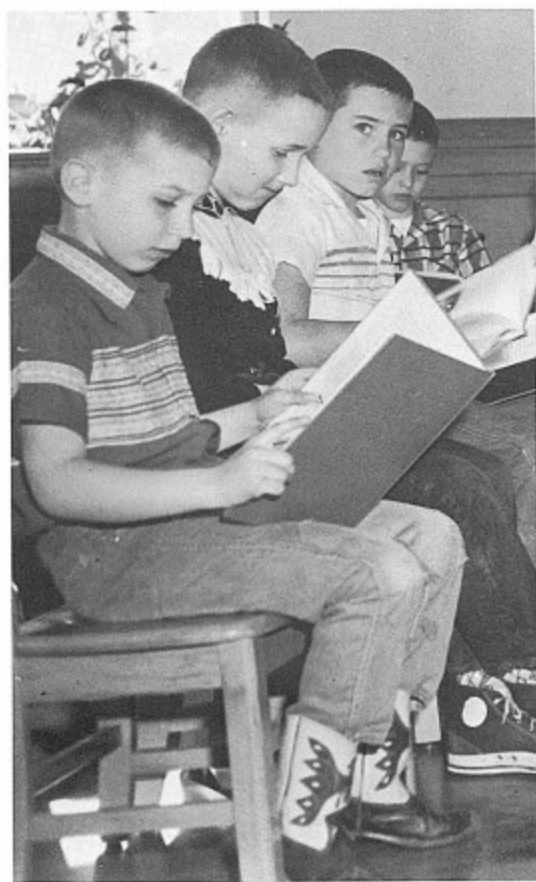

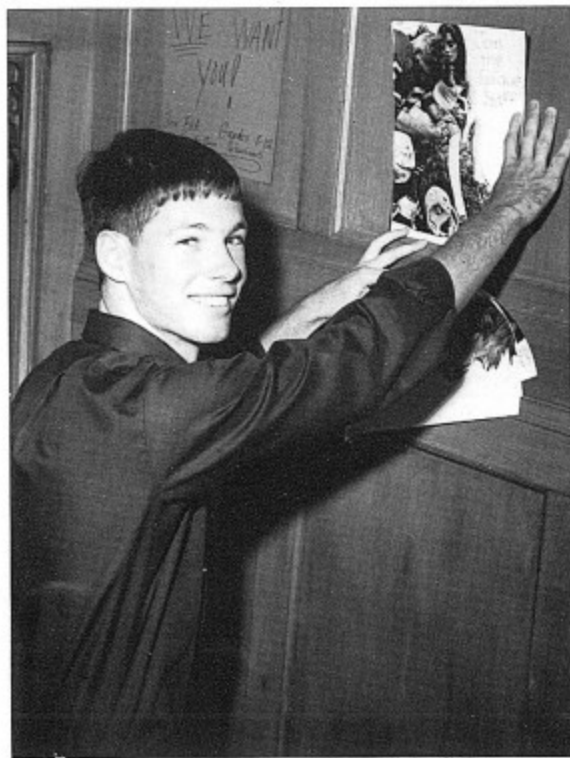

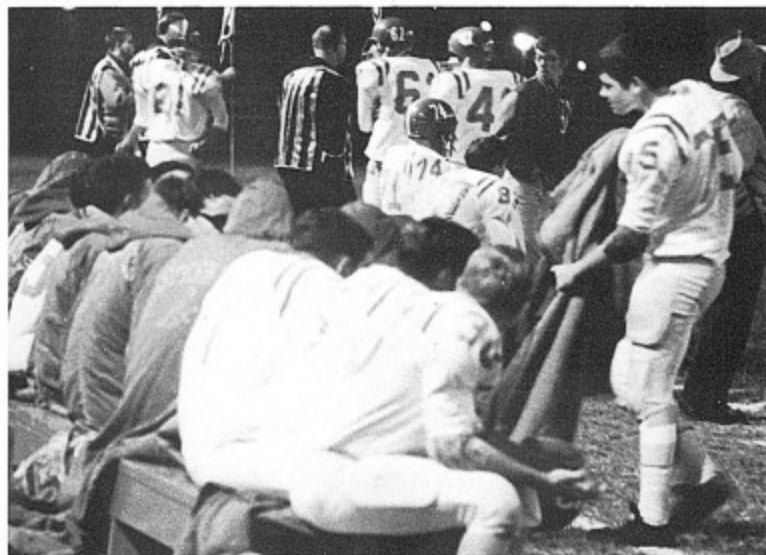

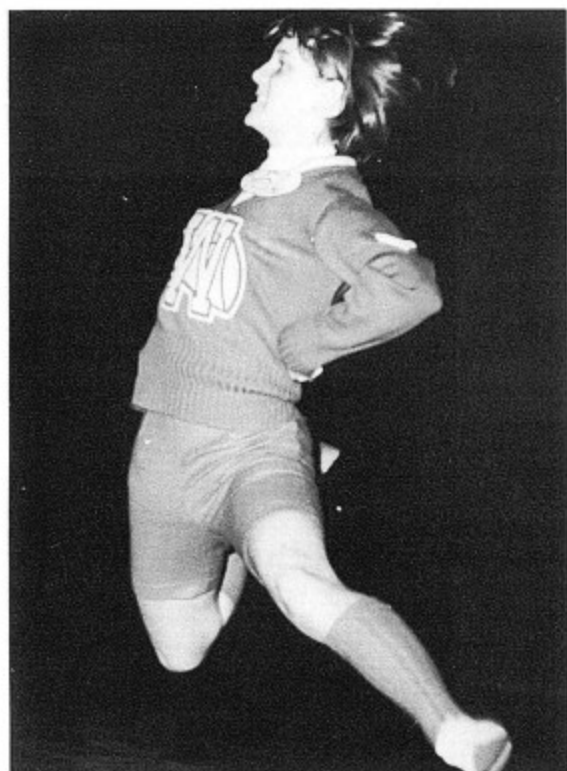

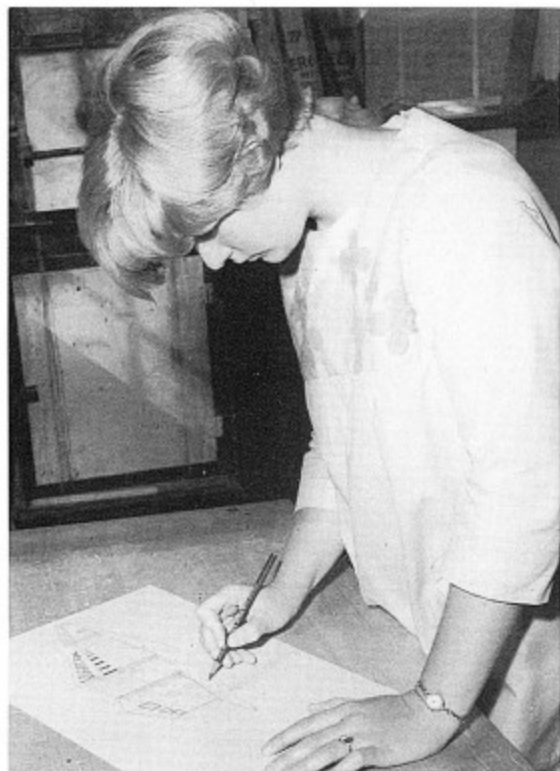

"Up, Up, and Away"

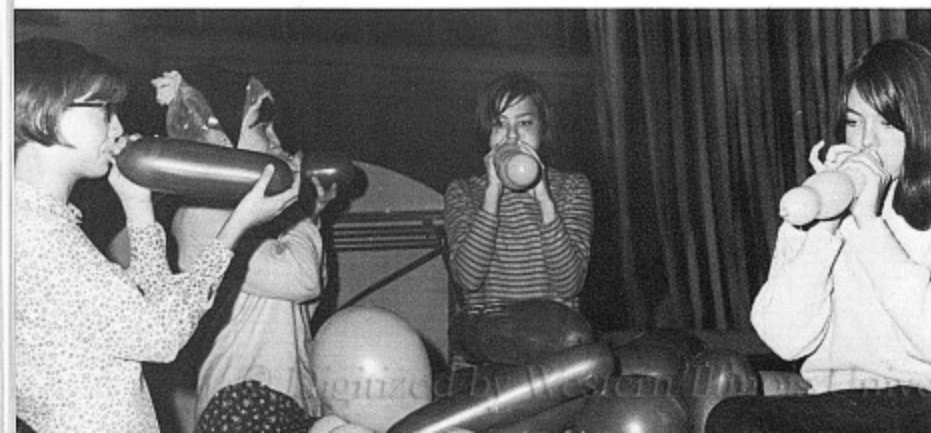

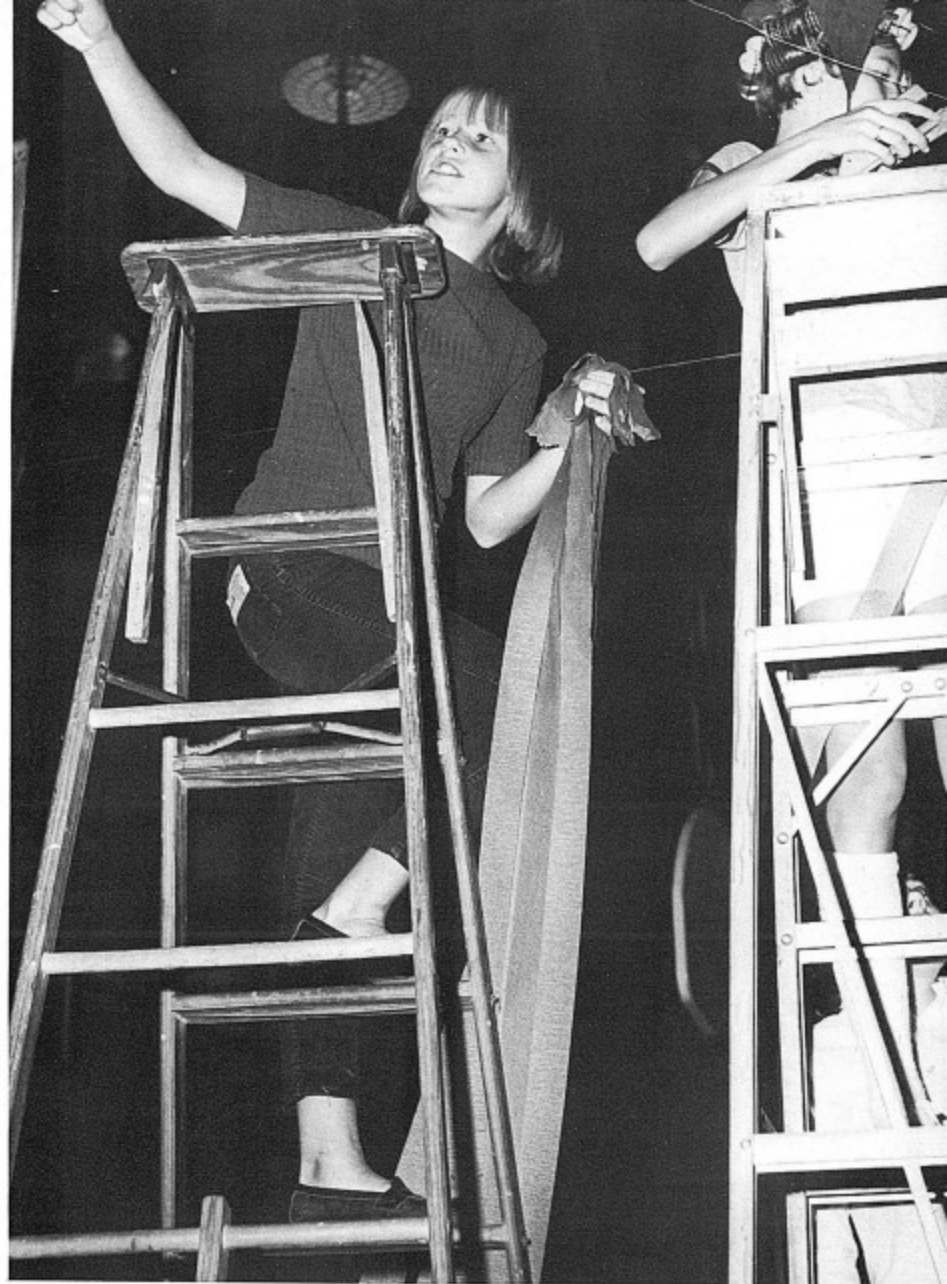
Neither snow nor rain nor cold of winds could stop Western's knights of the Cardinal from beating Hamilton 19-0.

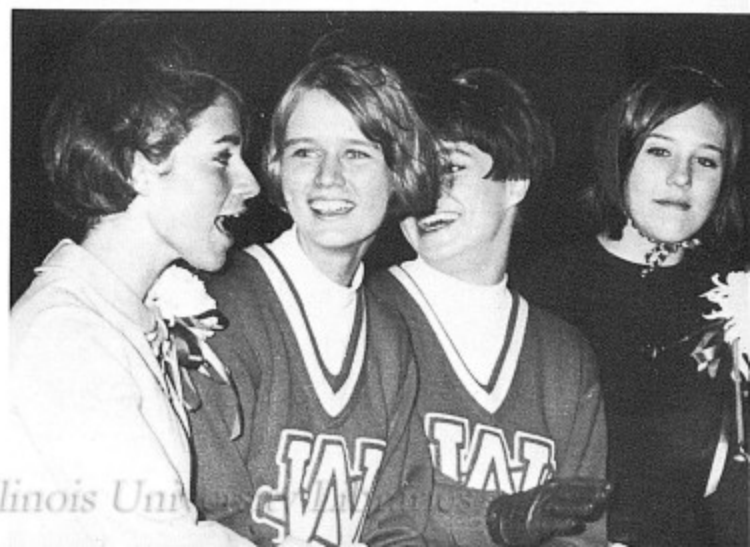
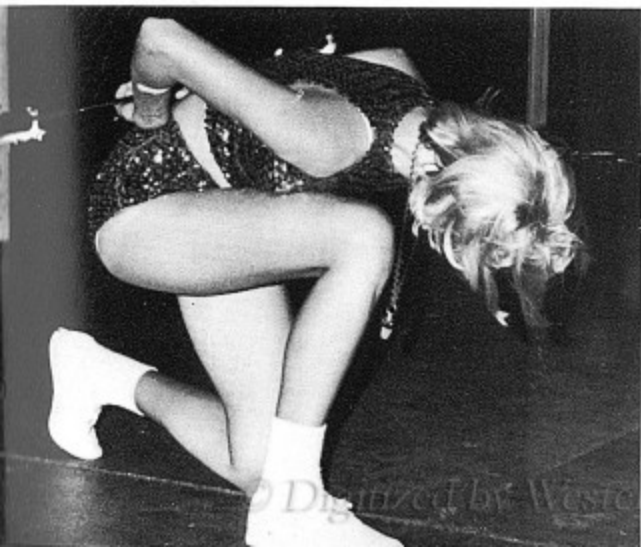
At the end of an exquisite evening, hundreds of colored balloons floated down over the dance floor, and Western lived happily ever after.

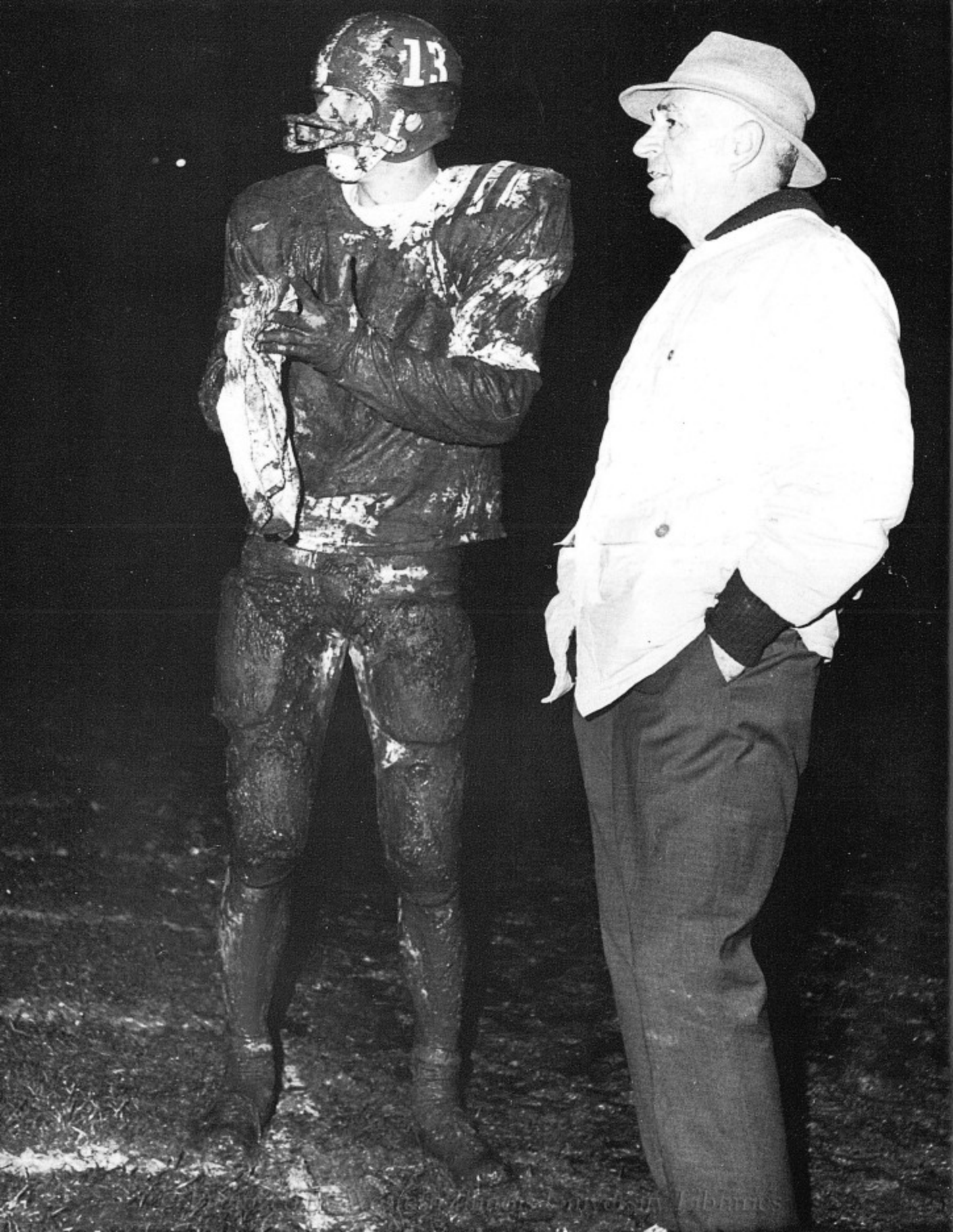


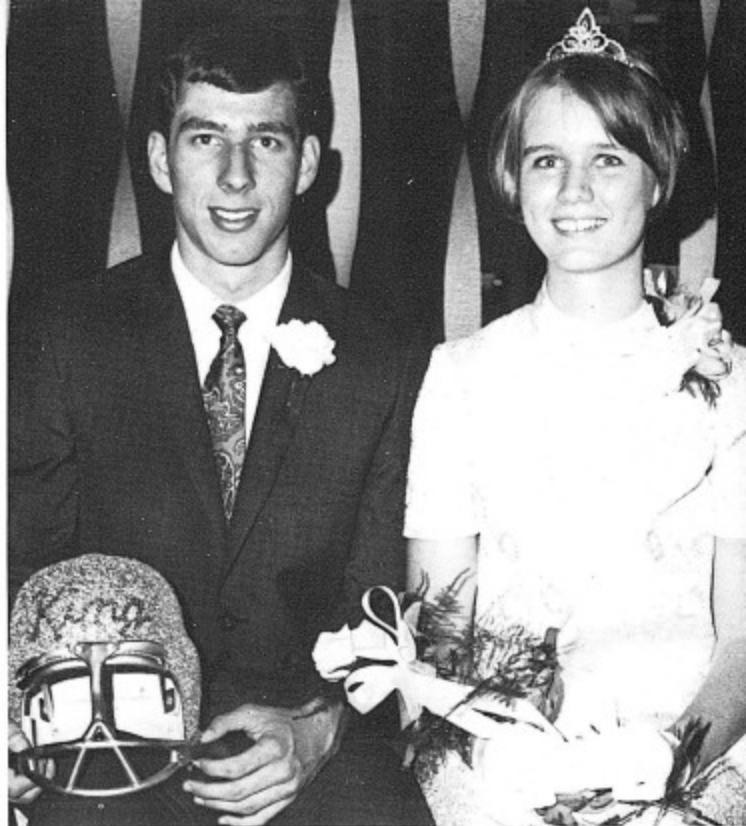

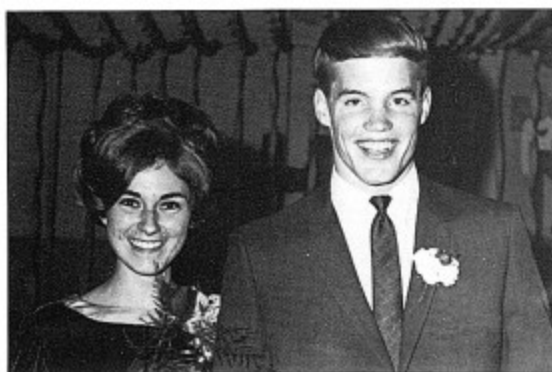

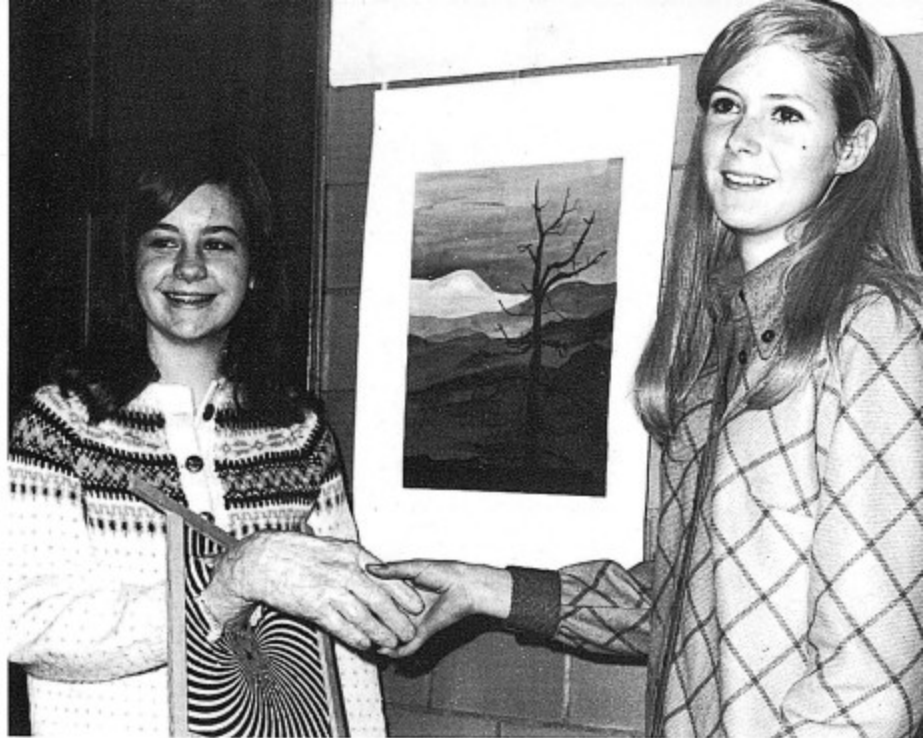
Miss Donley Returns to W.H.S.

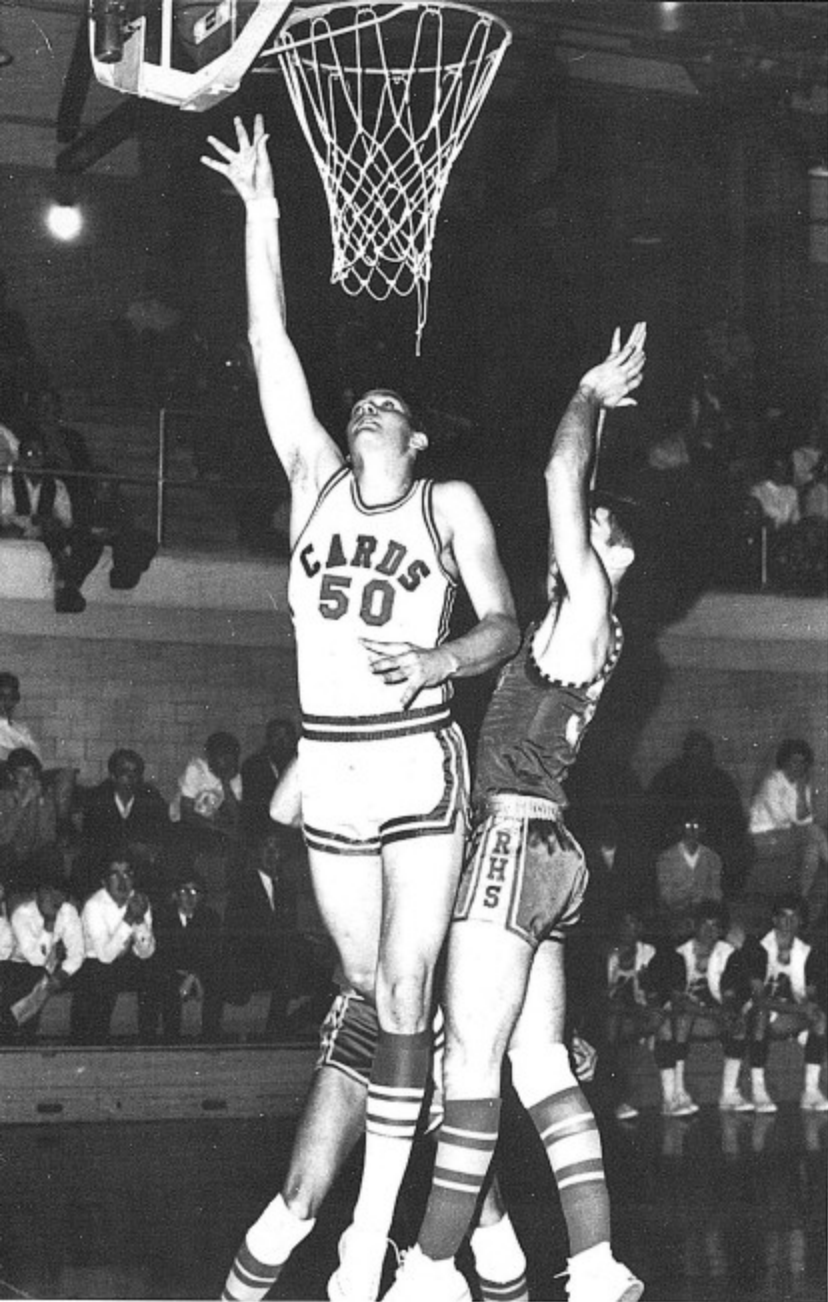

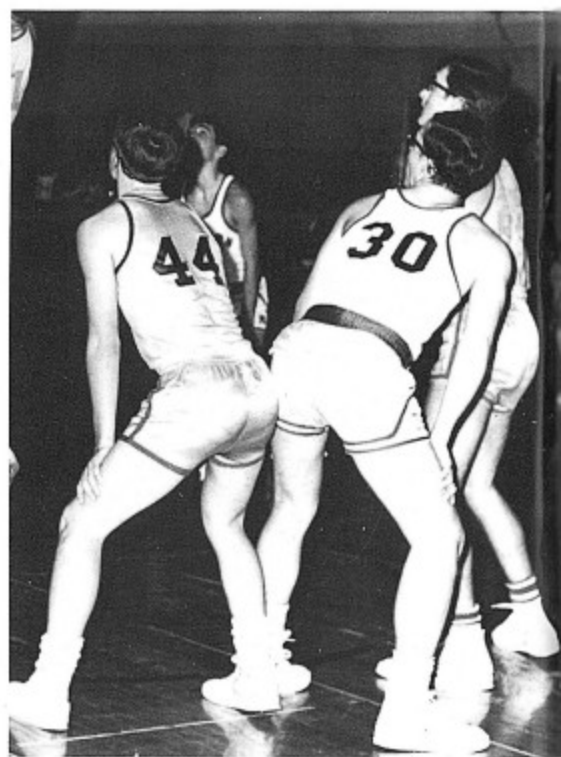

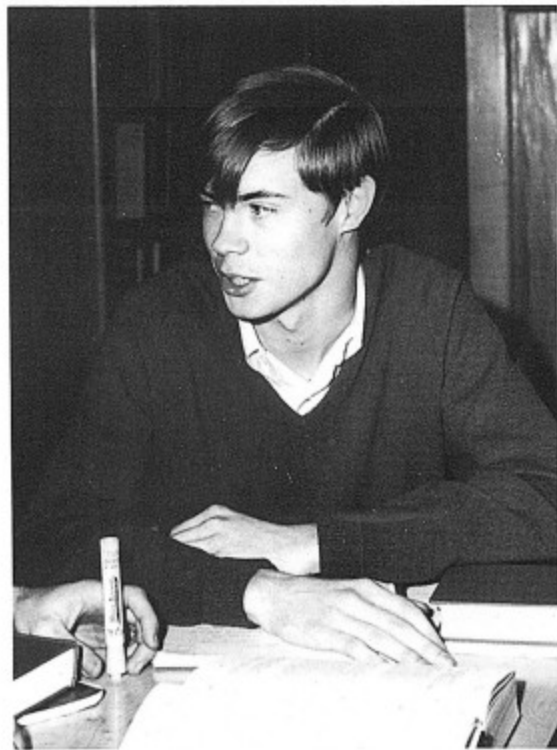

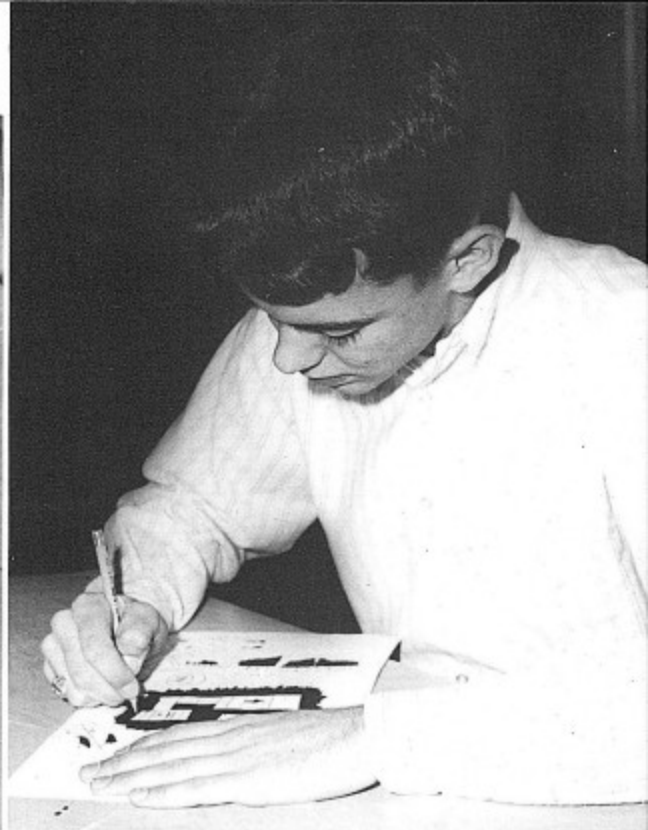

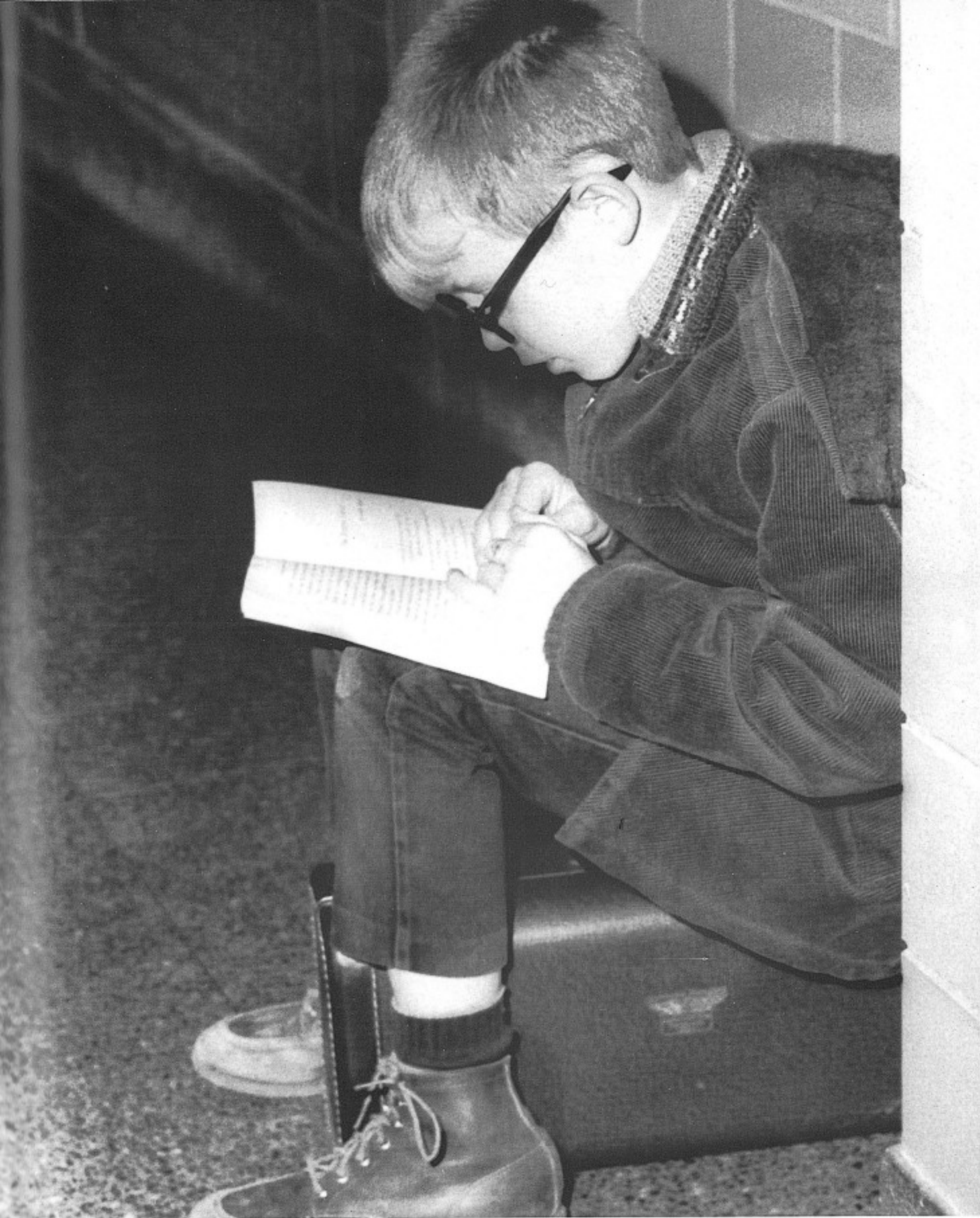

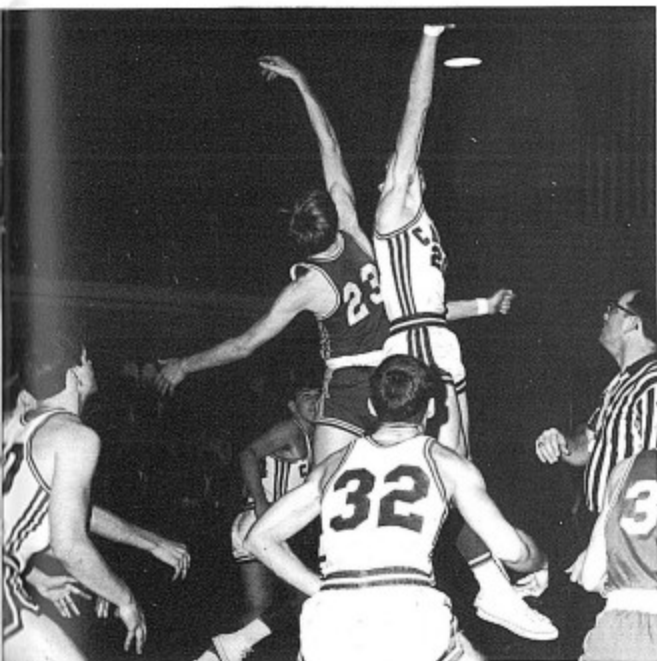

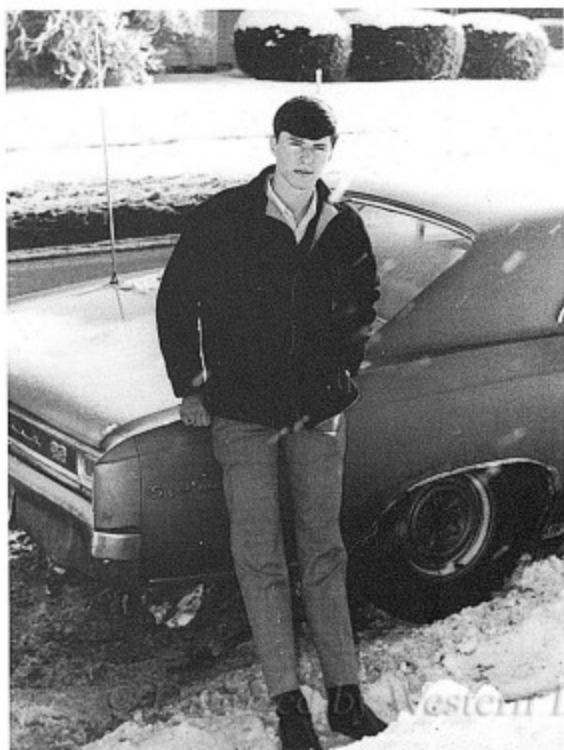

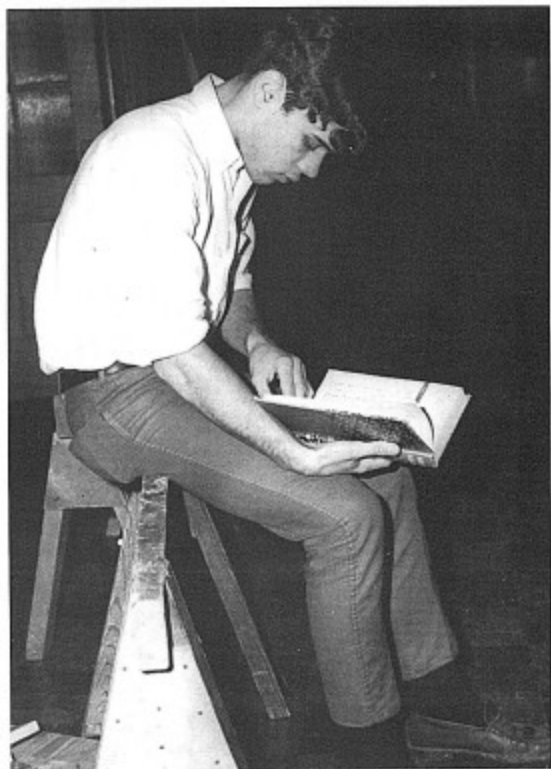

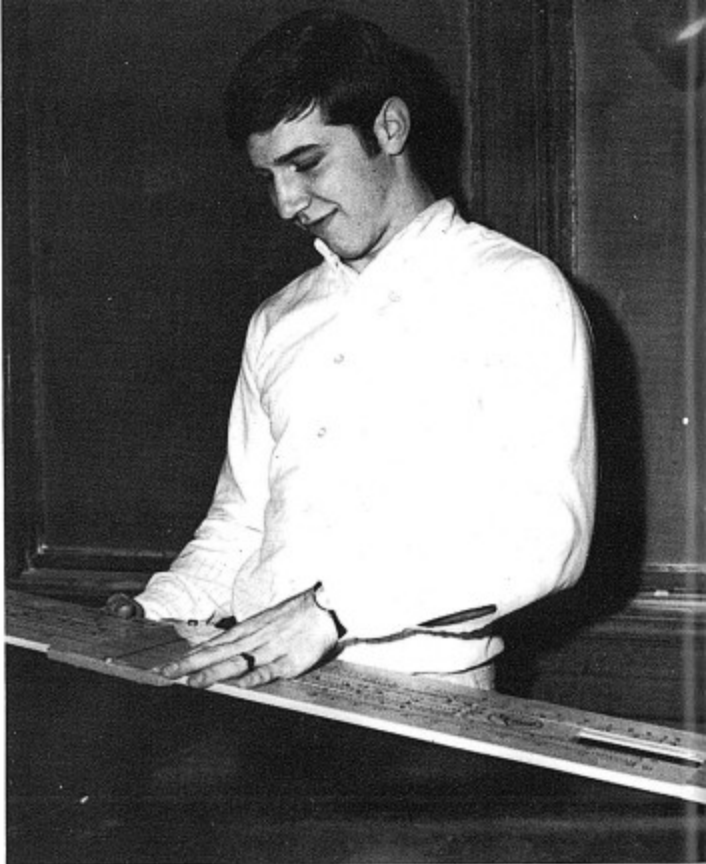

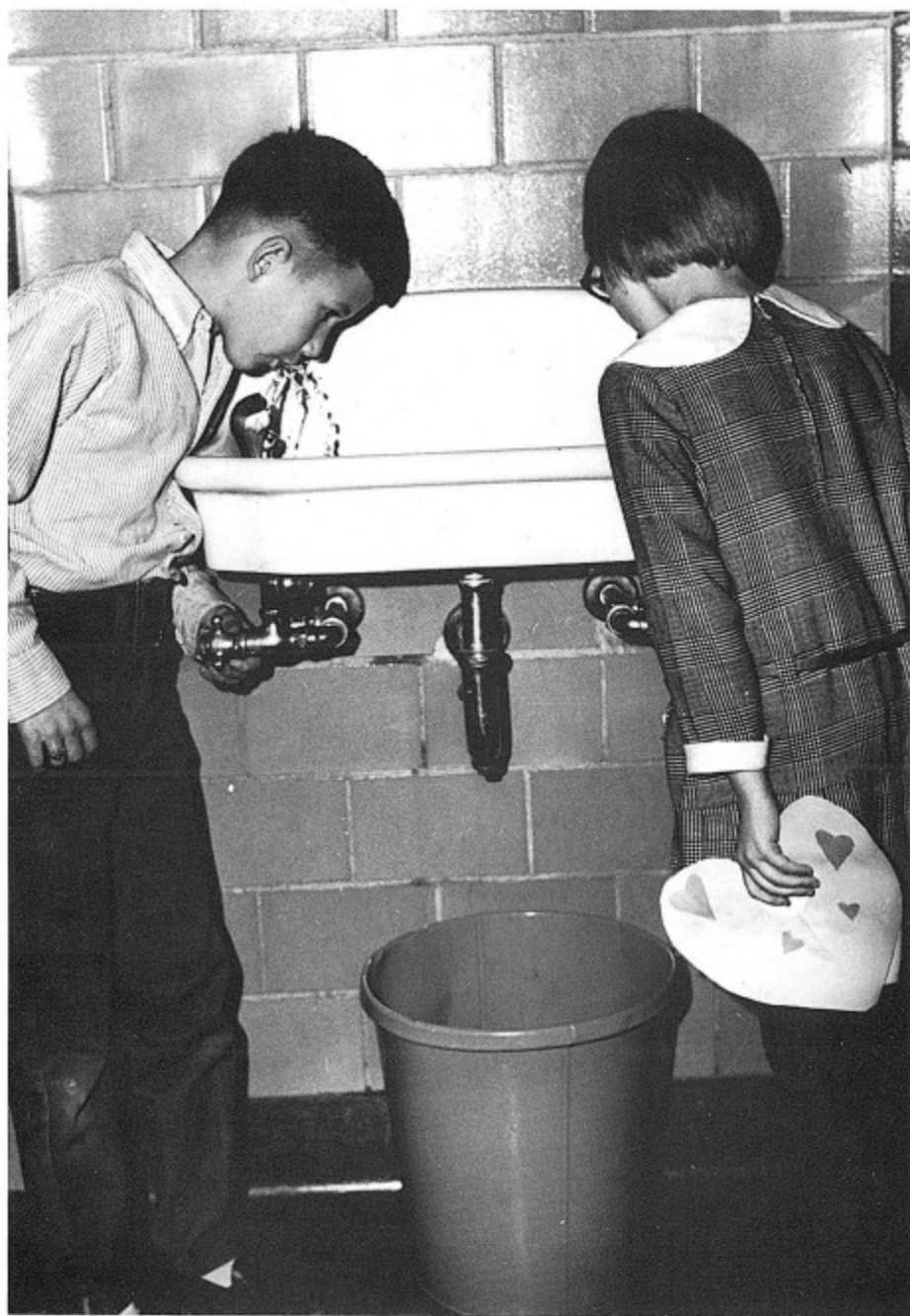

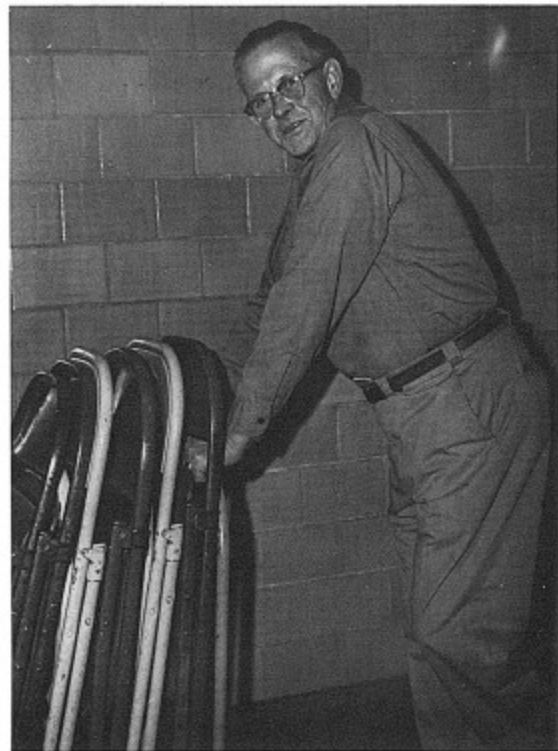

On August 31, 1968, Mr. H. Waldo Horrabin will end his 48th year at Western Illinois University. After having been graduated from the Academy in 1924, from Western Illinois State Teacher's College in 1928, he began teaching in the chemistry department of the College. Since 1950, he has been principal of the Western Campus School.

To know Mr. Horrabin is to recognize the flash of happiness in his eyes when he discusses a chemistry experiment, for he was a master teacher. To listen to Mr. Horrabin is to wonder at the pleasure in his voice as he quotes verbatim from Shakespeare or Wordsworth. To watch Mr. Horrabin is to be amused at the quality of his laughter as he relates a story of a former teacher or a joke on himself. To understand Mr. Horrabin is to follow his test of the hypothesis as he takes the opposite viewpoint to challenge the listener.

Mr. Horrabin is a scholar and places high demands upon himself. He was an administrator who was appreciated by teachers and students. He expected the good from those about him. He was keenly aware of the growing needs of the school and of the necessity of constant change, yet he himself represented much that is most vital in our tradition. His pride in the students and his devotion to the Campus School were very great. A teacher, a scholar, a colleague, a friend, Mr. Horrabin and his devoted wife will be remembered by generations of students with pride, gratitude, and affection.

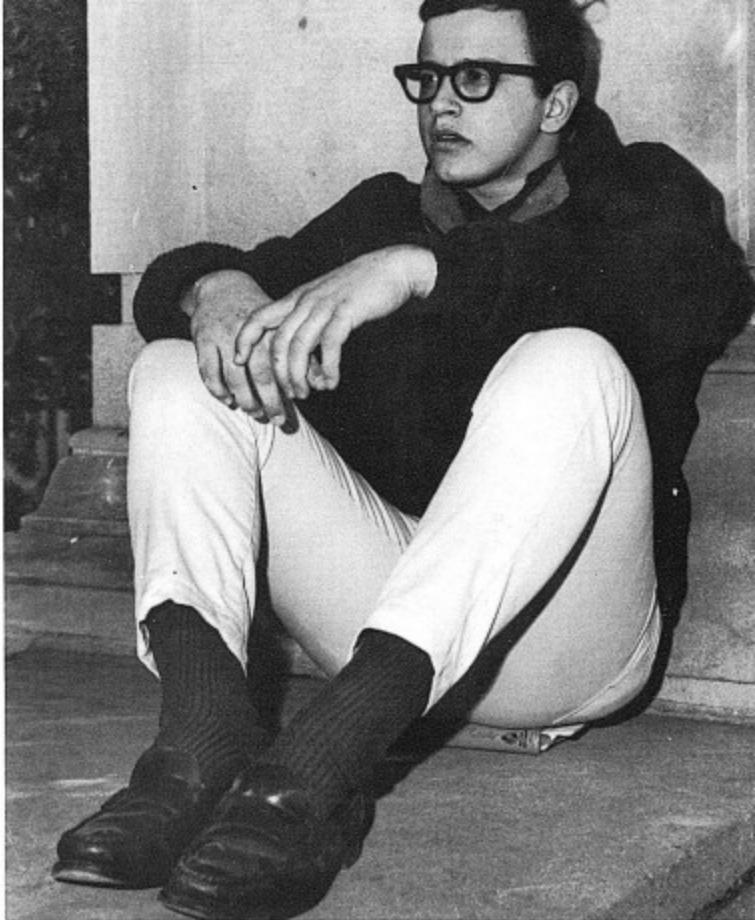

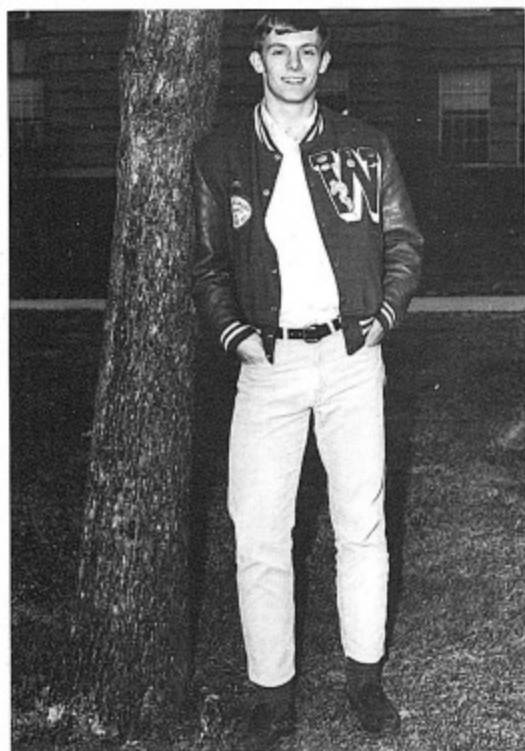

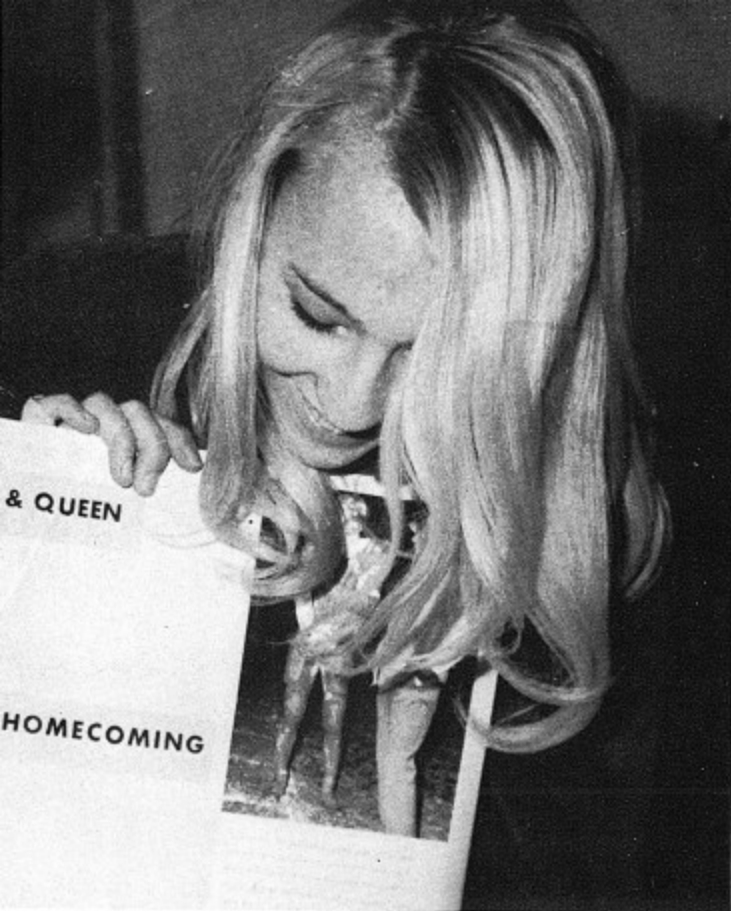

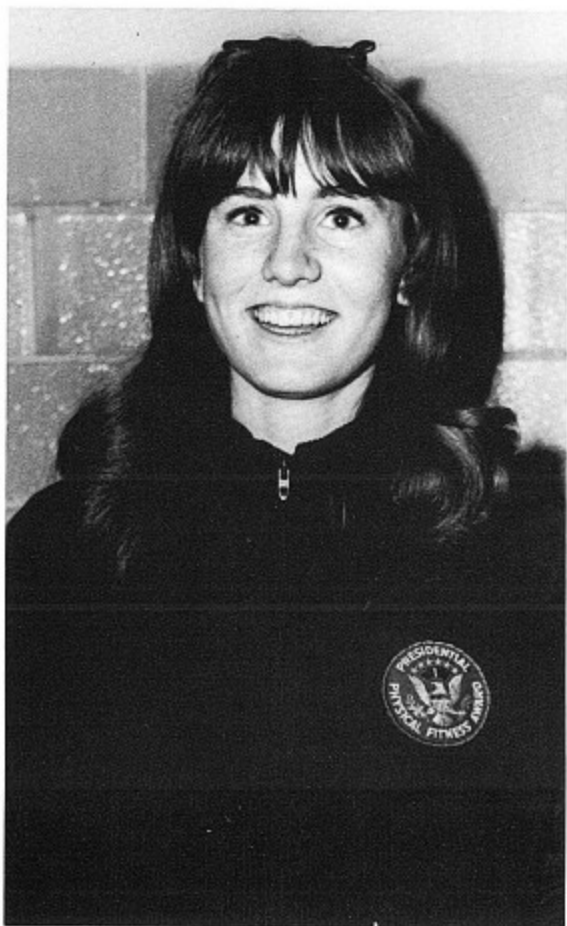


Above: Warm weather brings Jim Miner to the golf course. Left: After last year's success in the state track meet, Warren Abbot begins spring practice.

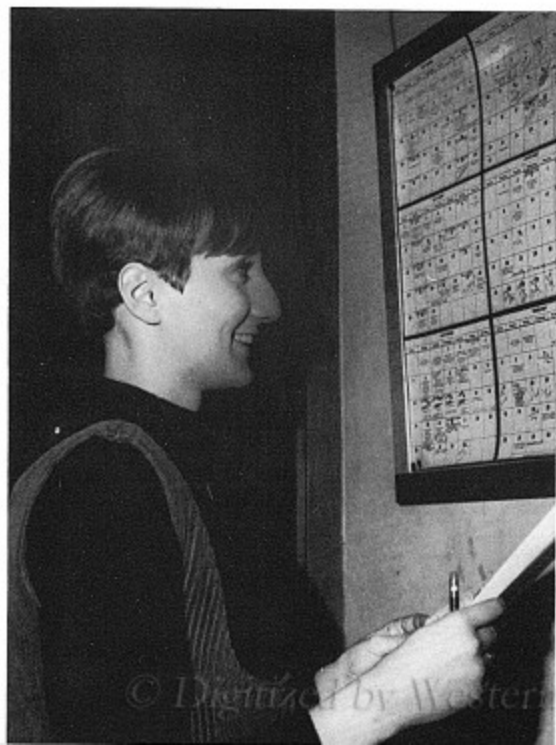


Mary Potter views some of the pictures she supervised as photography editor for the 10th annual *Epilogue*.

Western Students Try Harder

This page is devoted to all students who have earned honors. Although it is impossible to list all of those students who have received awards or those who are to earn them during the spring, at deadline time, some winners not already pictured on the pages of this *Epilogue* can be announced. All honors will be recognized during the annual program devoted to this recognition in the spring.

A year ago, at the District Exposition of the Junior Academy of Science, Tom Zimmerman received an outstanding rating and Chuck Gould, second-place. Tom went on to win a first-place award at the State Exposition. Lynne Johnson, Linda Halvorsen, Lois Krong and Lea Losasso attended a science symposium in April this year at the University of Iowa.

Kim Cunningham, Debbie Findley, Tom Fentem, Steve Julstrom, Bryant Julstrom, Sandy Wright, Linda Halvorsen and Tom Stipanowich were sponsored by the Macomb Elks Lodge and Macomb Rotary Club at the Western Music Camp, WIU, last summer. Senior students chose Mr. Horrabin as their commencement speaker as a final tribute before his retirement. 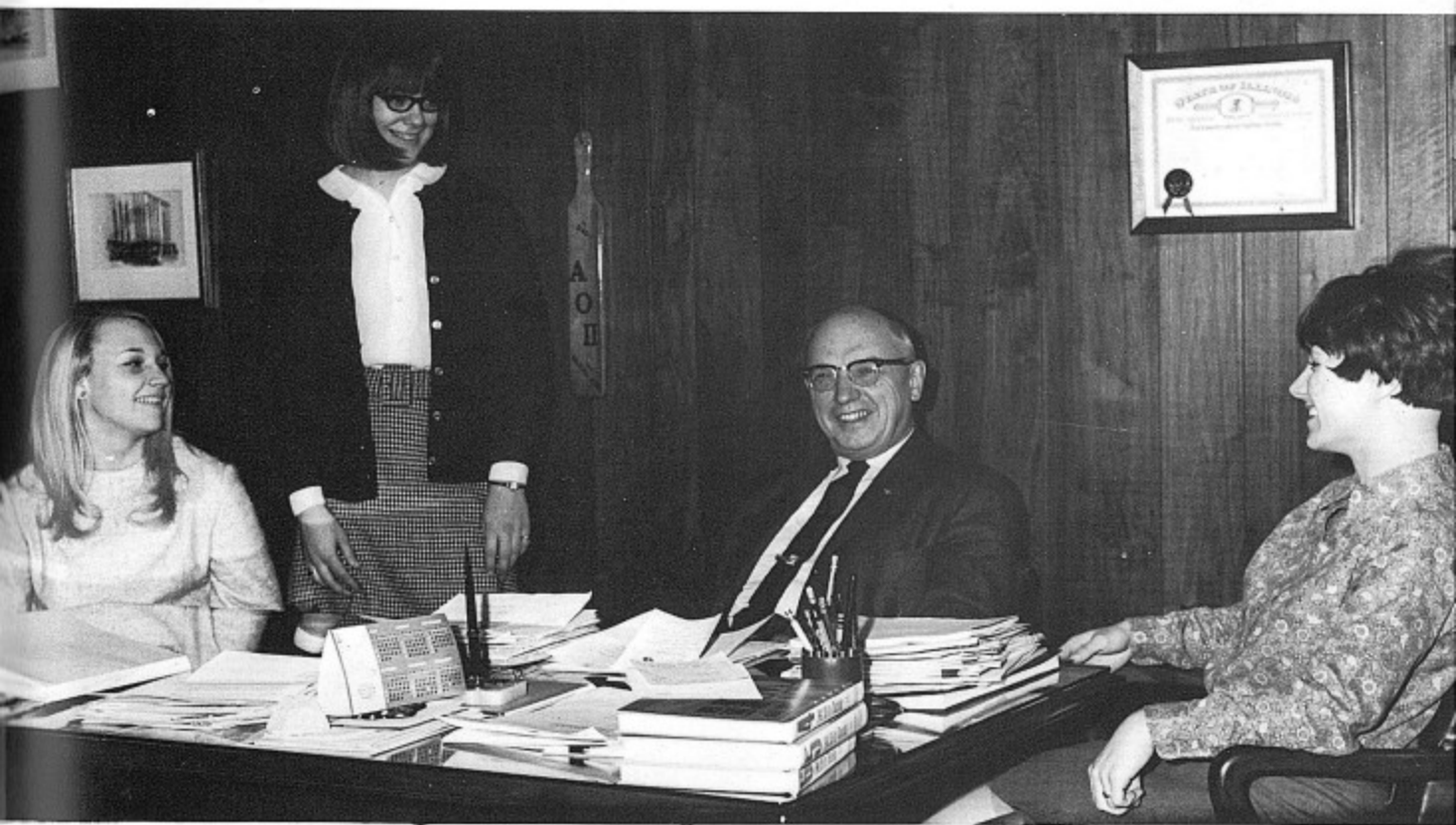
